The flag of Arkansas, also known as the **Arkansas flag**, consists of a rectangular field of red, on which is placed a large white diamond, bordered by a wide band of blue. Across the diamond is the word 'Arkansas' and four blue stars, one above, three below the word. On the blue band are how many stars?

The flag was adopted by the Arkansas legislature on February 26, 1913. It has had many different designs since then, the current flag is the one we use today.

Another way Arkansas was shaped, was through new settlements being developed. Lands used for farming, towns, roads, railroads, and eventually payment roads for vehicles. Not to mention natural occurrence through heavy rain, flooding, earthquakes, and climate changes.










Rice is an important food for people around the world. It is the leading crop for Arkansas farms. Almost half of all American rice, is grown in the eastern delta part of our state.






