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FOREWORD

Secretary of State Mark Martin

The Arkansas Legislature in 1895 charged the Secretary of State to publish a detailed report of the accomplishments of this office, as well as state government in general. This 2018 edition of the Historical Report is in response to that continuing mandate, and presents a compendium of historical, factual, and statistical information for the benefit of all Arkansans.

I was raised in a modest Delta farming family in East Arkansas. That background, when combined with my experience as a professional engineer, veteran Navy submariner, and three-term state legislator, instilled in me a profound passion for efficiency and an equally powerful aversion to waste.

In this volume you will find not only an historical record, but information useful for planning even greater improvements and efficiencies throughout the government of this great state - a goal which has been the centerpiece of my two terms of service as Arkansas Secretary of State.

With a vision of increasing service while simultaneously reducing costs, my staff and I accomplished a great deal in the eight years I have been honored to serve as the thirty-third Arkansas Secretary of State.

Our Business and Commercial Services Division handles corporate filings and franchise taxes and is our largest division. We modernized and enhanced

our offerings in this area, including initial steps for the migration of services to an online business portal, and the establishment of the “Dream It, Do It” program to foster business growth in the state. Both programs streamline and bring automation to the process of starting or maintaining a business, reducing the amount of money and time businesses are forced to spend on paperwork such that ninety-five percent of business filings may now be completed online. Electronic Notary services also were implemented and upgraded such that this office has become a recognized national innovator in this area, even authoring the E-Notary Implementation Guide for the National Association of Secretaries of State as an aid in establishing national services and standards.

When I first took office, state election systems were in need of significant upgrades in both equipment and efficiencies. This office immediately set out to streamline and better secure our elections using a voter verification process. Continuing pressure from our office upon the legislature resulted in passage of a court-approved voter verification process. Implemented in all 75 counties, voters are required to provide some form of valid identification in order to cast a ballot.

In 2016, we also began purchasing and providing upgraded, more secure voting systems and equipment to counties across Arkansas. Since legislative appropriation was not provided for this

effort, we implemented an austerity program within our own budget, diverting the funds gleaned to support the much-needed improvements in our state election equipment. These funds, coupled with those from a Help America Vote Act (HAVA) federal grant this office successfully sought, made all of these improvements without additional appropriation from the legislature.

Oversight of the Capitol Building and grounds are also a responsibility of this office. When my staff and I began my first term in 2011, we took responsibility for a building that had been neglected in many respects. We immediately prioritized restoration of this monument so that it might serve as a source of pride and unity for the people of our state, and the visitors we welcome to it every day. But these repairs and improvements were implemented to not only improve the beauty and historic significance of the building, but to increase the efficiency of its workspaces, climate and electrical systems, and structural integrity so that the savings would ultimately result in no net costs to the taxpayer.

And finally, during the course of our renovations, innovations, and day-to-day operations, our Communications and Education Division both documented and kept the public and media informed about our progress and the impact of these improvements. This was done while providing ongoing classroom training and workshops for students and teachers across the state.

In addition to these functions, this office maintains security of the building through our very capable Capitol Police officers, who must simultaneously serve in law-enforcement and public affairs capacities. We also host the Capitol Historian, who in addition to his other ongoing duties, has organized and overseen the production of this volume. And Information Technology, Business, and Human Resources staff support the operation of all that we do here.

Although my name appears on so many things in this office, it is not I who deserves credit for the progress recited. This office would not and could not function without the support of our constituents. And in the same way, I could not properly serve the public without the support of each and every member of this office that has worked alongside me. None of the services, accomplishments, and innovations presented here would have been realized without the staff that serves this state each day, and I hope that readers of this volume will be reminded of this as they review its contents. This volume is both a tribute and an expression of thanks to them.

ABOUT THE HISTORICAL REPORT

The Arkansas Secretary of State's office is pleased to present the 2018 edition of the *Historical Report of the Secretary of State*. It is published decennially by order of the Arkansas General Assembly and is a compendium of rosters of elected officials who have served territory, state and nation over the past two centuries. Featured essays offer insight into the state's history, demography and politics.

This edition rests on more than a century of similar publications. In 1895, the General Assembly first mandated the publication of a biennial report that detailed the activities and accomplishments of the Secretary of State's office and state government

in general, including statistical and historical information "as will be useful and instructive to the citizens of this state." The contents of these reports varied by administration until the series ended with the 1926 edition. The tradition was revived in 1958 when Secretary of State C.G. "Crip" Hall published a volume that has served as a model for its successors, including this seventh decennial edition.

For 2018, the *Historical Report* includes two new appendices: lists of all known African American and female legislators. Users of previous editions will note that county elected officials are not included in this volume; these will be issued in a separate publication in the near future.

CHAPTER 1
THE NATURAL STATE



BIRTH CERTIFICATE: THE BEGINNING OF ARKANSAS

In United States law, an organic act is an act of Congress that establishes a territory of the United States and specifies how it is to be governed, or designates an agency to manage certain federal lands. In the absence of an organic law a territory is classified as unorganized.

The first such act was the Northwest Ordinance, adopted in 1787 by the U.S. Congress of the Confederation (under the Articles of Confederation, the predecessor of the United States Constitution).

The Northwest Ordinance created the Northwest Territory in the land west of Pennsylvania and northwest of the Ohio River and set the pattern of development that would be followed for subsequent territories.

In August of 1803, word reached the interior of what had been the French domain of Louisiana that the territory had been sold and transferred to the United States. The purchase was initially divided into two parts: land north of the thirty-third parallel (including present-day Arkansas) became the District of Louisiana, which was added to the jurisdiction of the Indiana Territory. This proved impractical for purposes of governance, so in 1804 Congress reorganized the territory and created the Louisiana Territory with its government seat in St. Louis.

The land south of the thirty-third parallel, then known as the Territory of Orleans, became the state of Louisiana in 1812. The Louisiana Territory (including present-day Arkansas) was renamed the Missouri

Territory at the same time. By the end of the decade, the population of Missouri's southernmost county grew sufficiently to qualify for territorial status on its own. In the late winter of 1819 a measure establishing a new territory, to be called "Arkansaw," made its way through Congress and was approved on March 2. This legislation, reprinted below in its entirety, marks the legal inception of what would become today's state of Arkansas. It is, in effect, Arkansas's "birth certificate," which marks its 200th anniversary in 2019.



CHAP. XLIX.-AN ACT establishing a separate territorial government in the southern part of the territory of Missouri.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That from and after the fourth day of July next, all that part of the territory of Missouri which lies south of a line, beginning on the Mississippi river, at thirty-six degrees, north latitude, running thence west to the river St. Francois; thence, up the same, to thirty-six degrees thirty minutes north latitude; and thence, west, to the western territorial boundary line; shall, for the purposes of a territorial government, constitute a separate territory, and be called the Arkansaw territory.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That there shall be established in the said territory of Arkansaw, a temporary government, to consist of three departments, the executive, the legislative, and the judiciary.

Sec. 3. *And be it further enacted*, That the executive power shall be vested in a governor, who shall reside in the said territory, and shall hold his office during three years, unless sooner removed by the President of the United States: he shall be commander in chief of the militia of said territory, shall have power to appoint and commission all officers required by law to be appointed for said territory, whose appointments are not otherwise provided for by this act; shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed; shall have power to grant pardons for offences against the said territory, and reprieves for those against the United States, until the decision of the President thereon shall have been made known; shall, on extraordinary occasions, have power to convene the general assembly, hereinafter provided for, after one shall have been organized in conformity to law; shall ex-officio, be superintendent of Indian affairs, and shall have such other powers, and perform such further duties, as are by law given to, and imposed on, the governor of the Missouri territory, in all cases in which they shall become legally applicable to the territory of Arkansas.

Sec. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That there shall be a secretary for the said territory, who shall reside therein, and continue in office for the term of four years, unless sooner removed by the President: he shall perform all the duties imposed on the secretary for the territory of Missouri, by an act of Congress of the fourth of June, eighteen hundred and twelve, entitled "An act providing for the government of Missouri."

Sec. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That the legislative power shall, until the organization of the general assembly, hereinafter provided

for, be vested in the governor and the judges of the superior court of the territory, who shall have power to pass any law for the administration of justice in said territory, which shall not be repugnant to this act, or inconsistent with the constitution of the United States: *Provided*, That whenever the general assembly shall be organized, all the legislative power of the territory shall be vested in, and be exercised by, the said general assembly.

Sec. 6. *And be it further enacted*, That so much of the act of Congress of the fourth of June, eighteen hundred and twelve, entitled "An act providing for the government of the territory of Missouri," as relates to the organization of a general assembly therein, prescribes the powers and privileges thereof, the mode of election, and period of service, of the members thereof, and defines the qualifications and privileges of the electors and elected, shall be in full force and operation in the Arkansas territory, to the extent of its application, so soon as the governor thereof shall be satisfied that such is the desire of a majority of the freeholders thereof, and not until then: *Provided*, That until there shall be five thousand free white males, of the age of twenty-one years and upwards, resident in the said territory, the whole number of representatives shall not exceed nine.

Sec. 7. *And be it further enacted*, That the judicial power of the territory shall be vested in a superior court, and in such inferior courts as the legislative department of the territory shall, from time to time, institute and establish, and in justices of the peace. The superior court shall be composed of three judges, who shall reside in the territory and continue in office for the term of four years, unless sooner removed

by the President. The superior court shall have jurisdiction in all criminal and penal cases, and exclusive cognizance of all capital cases, and shall have and exercise original jurisdiction, concurrently with the inferior courts, and exclusive appellate jurisdiction in all civil cases in which the amount in controversy shall be one hundred dollars or upwards. The superior court shall be holden [sic] at such times and place, or places, as the legislative department shall direct, and continue in session until the business therein shall be disposed of, or as long as shall be prescribed by law. *Provided*, that any two of the judges shall constitute a court of appellate, and any one a court of original jurisdiction.

Sec. 8. *And be it further enacted*, That the governor, secretary, judges, and all other officers, of the territory, civil and military, shall, before they enter on the duties of their respective offices, take an oath or affirmation oath to support the constitution of the United States, and to discharge, with fidelity, the duties of their offices; the governor before a judge of the supreme or district court of the United States, or a judge of the superior court of the said territory; the secretary and judges, before the said governor, or a judge of the supreme or district court of the United States; and all other officers, before the governor, or any of the judges of the supreme or inferior courts, or justices of the peace, of said territory.

Sec. 9. *And be it further enacted*, That the governor, secretary, and judges of the superior court authorized for said territory, during the government thereof, shall be appointed by the President of the United States, with the advice and consent of the Senate: *Provided*, That the President shall have full power, during the recess of the

Senate, to commission all or any of the said officers, until the end of the session of Congress next succeeding the date of the commission. The governor, secretary, and judges of the superior court, shall receive the same compensation, payable quarter-yearly, which the governor, secretary, and superior, of the Missouri territory are entitled to by law.

Sec. 10. *And be it further enacted*, That all the laws which shall be in force in the territory of Missouri, on the fourth day of July next, not inconsistent with the provisions of this act, and which shall be applicable to the territory of Arkansas, shall be, and continue, in force in the territory, until modified or repealed by the legislative authority thereof.

Sec. 11. *And be it further enacted*, That the bounty lands granted, or to be granted, for military services during the late war, shall, while they continue to be held by the patentees or their heirs, remain exempt from all taxes, for the term of three years from and after the date of the patents respectively.

Sec. 12. *And be it further enacted*, That whenever, according to the provisions of this act, the people of the Arkansas territory shall have a right to elect members of the house of representatives of their assembly, they shall also have the right to elect a delegate from the territory to the Congress of the United States, who shall possess the same powers, enjoy the same privileges, and receive the same compensation, granted and secured by law to the delegates from other territories.

Sec. 13. *And be it further enacted*, That until otherwise directed by the legislative department of the said territory of

Arkansaw, the seat of the territorial government thereof shall be the post of Arkansaw, on the Arkansaw river.

Sec. 14. *And be it further enacted*, That the line now established by law, between the land offices at the seat of justice in the county of Lawrence, and at the town of Jackson, in the county of Cape Gireadeau[sic], shall, from and after the passage of this act, be so altered as to run, be the same, and correspond, with the northern line of the said territory of Arkansaw, anything in the act, entitled “ An act making provision for the establishment of additional land offices in the territory of Missouri,” passed the seventeenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighteen to the contrary, notwithstanding.

NATIVE ARKANSAS FROM THE LOUISIANA PURCHASE TO STATEHOOD

Arkansas first came into existence as a political entity in 1806 when Louisiana Territorial authorities set up an Arkansas District to provide local government for the thousand or so recent American immigrants who did not wish to travel hundreds of miles to New Madrid or St. Louis to carry out business and government affairs. At the time, and for the next 30 years, much of the Arkansas landscape was controlled or claimed by American Indian tribes that had long resided in the District, or who took up temporary residence as social and political confrontations further east pushed Native people west of the Mississippi River. Arkansas became a territory in its own right in 1819.

Indian affairs had a significant effect on Arkansas territorial political and economic activities, first as resident tribes surrendered their rights to Arkansas land and left for less confrontational residence further west, then as large parts of the District were restricted from American settlement and given to Indian tribes, and finally as waves of Eastern tribes passed through to promised reservation lands in Indian territory. The tribes resident in Arkansas were among the first Native people to be uprooted from traditional homelands and pushed westward out of the District, and were inadvertent victims of American Indian policies directed primarily at the large tribes back east. When Arkansas became a state in 1836, there were no longer any resident American

Indian settlements present, but Arkansans continued for several years to witness, and in some instances to profit from, periodic appearances of thousands of Indians who passed on foot, in wagons, by horseback and on boats across the state.

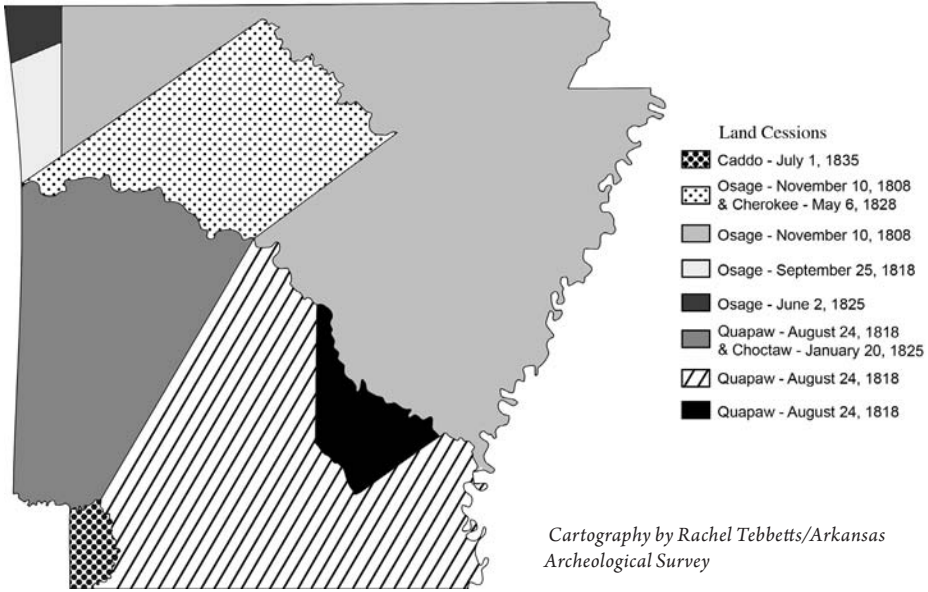


In the first years after the Louisiana Purchase, there were relatively few and scattered Native communities in Arkansas, but several tribes considered large tracts of land to be under their authority and control for agriculture, hunting, and other activities. Although territorial boundaries were poorly defined, there was little land in Arkansas that was not viewed as proprietary by one tribe or another. For some, the expectation of territorial rights was based in long residence by ancestral communities.

Most of southwest Arkansas had been part of the Caddo area for 800 years. The southern Caddos resided in many separate Caddo communities in places that later became Louisiana, Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas. Their lifestyle was based on farming corn, beans, squash and melons, sunflowers, and other crops, and hunting, fishing, and gathering wild plants and animals. Families lived in sturdy permanent dwellings made with timber, cane, grass, and bark. Communities were made up of far flung family farmstead groups. Religious and political leadership was inherited among some privileged families.

Archeological evidence shows that Caddos lived throughout the hills and river valleys

southwest of the Arkansas River through the 1500s, when they had tumultuous encounters with members of the Hernando de Soto expedition. Over the next two centuries, Caddo villages became fewer in number and more concentrated along the Ouachita and Red Rivers where French and Spanish explorers found them in the late 1600s and early 1700s. For another century the Red River Caddo were influential neighbors and trading partners to both Spanish and French colonial settlements. Episodes of disease, provocative confrontations with other Native tribes, and increased numbers of European and American settlers and adventurers eventually convinced the Arkansas Caddo to leave their traditional villages by about 1780 and move south to what is now northwest Louisiana, closer to friendly French colonial settlements and to Caddo living in Louisiana and Texas. The ruins of Caddo settlements were still visible to members of the Freeman

Custis expedition when it explored the Red River in 1806.

Although the Caddo no longer resided in Arkansas by the early 19th century, they considered the area their land. They permitted small bands of immigrant Natives, including Delawares, Shawnees, and Arkansas Cherokees to establish short-lived communities near the Red River. American settlement was slow since the Great Raft—an enormous log-jam extending for some 160 miles along the Red River from northeast Louisiana to southwest Arkansas—made river transportation difficult. When the U.S. Government installed a trading factory at the confluence of Sulfur Fork and the Red River in 1817, the Caddo chief Dehahuit reminded the trader that the establishment was on Caddo land and therefore should give trading priority to Caddo hunters and families downstream.

It was not until 1835 when the Red River Caddo, then much reduced in number and pressured by settlers and hostile Native neighbors, signed away their claims to ancestral lands and agreed to move out of the United States and into what was then Mexico just west of the Louisiana and Arkansas borders. The war of Texas independence from Mexico prevented their relocation until after 1840.

While the Caddo claimed what became southwest Arkansas, the Osage claimed rights to much of North Arkansas along and north of the Arkansas River. The Osage villages were located in southwest Missouri and along western tributaries of the Arkansas upstream from what became Fort Smith, but they took proprietary interest in hunting and trading activities, asserting their interests with raids on travelers, hunters, and settlers as far south as the Caddo villages on Red River. Osage villages consisted of closely arranged long houses built of timber, bark and grass, with nearby fields of corn, beans, pumpkins and other plants. Traditional religious and political leadership was based on achievement and many years of dedicated apprenticeship and training. By the time of the Louisiana Purchase, Osages had become deeply involved in the Illinois French colonial economy and spent large amounts of time when not needed in their fields hunting and raiding on the southern plains and elsewhere in Louisiana for bison meat, horses, captives, and goods valued by Illinois trading houses. Access to Osage villages influenced the placement of colonial European trading posts and larger settlements supported by the Indian trade in Arkansas and Louisiana.

The American government took early measures to restrict Osage influence with treaties in 1808 and 1818 that ceded Osage

claims to Ozark lands. Even from a distance, however, Osages continued to influence Arkansas territorial affairs. The 1818 treaty cleared the way for the U.S. government to establish a reserve embracing most of the Arkansas Ozarks for Cherokees that had been moving across the Mississippi River from time to time since the late 1700s. Uneasy neighbors from the start, Osages and Cherokees began a cycle of tribal confrontations that occasionally swept up American settlers as well in bloody raids that dominated territorial affairs until the mid 1820s, when the military establishment at Fort Smith and diplomatic efforts calmed the situation.

The Mississippi Delta, lower Arkansas River valley and elsewhere east of the Ozarks and Ouachita River basin was Quapaw land at the time of the Louisiana Purchase. Most Quapaws resided in a few established villages on the lower Arkansas River in dwellings built of timber, bark, thatch, and woven matting. Like the Osage and Caddo, Quapaws were farmers whose corn, beans, sunflowers and other crops were spread in extensive agricultural fields extending from their residences. Living closely astride the Mississippi River, Quapaws became important allies to colonial French and Spanish traders, helping maintain open commerce along the Mississippi River between St. Louis and New Orleans.

After nearly a century of continuous contact with French colonial residents and traders, as well as with many other Native tribes, many Quapaws were part of multi-racial and multi-ethnic households. A number of French-Quapaw families resided in European style farmsteads, and held Spanish issued land grants, in several areas including along the Arkansas River in the vicinity of

the future Little Rock. Others remained in villages in the vicinity of Arkansas Post. Repeated incidents of disease and warfare had reduced their population to less than 600 individuals, small numbers to maintain their homeland while American immigration accelerated after the War of 1812.

Quapaw leaders were forced to cede 30 million acres of land in 1818, including the Arkansas River valley west into what is now Oklahoma, and the Delta. They retained a small wedge of land, one million acres, between the west bank of the Arkansas River just downstream from the future site of Little Rock, and the Ouachita River. Few noticed that a large part of the cession was land once part of the Caddo domain and still of interest to the Caddo.

The remaining Quapaw land was in the path of rapidly growing American settlement that included rich alluvial farmland and the newly designated territorial capital. In 1824, the Quapaws surrendered the last of their homeland to the U.S. government in exchange for new land in Louisiana among the Caddo, a handful of small land grants along the Arkansas to some French-Quapaw families, and a decade worth of annual payments. Unfortunately, no one seems to have informed the Caddo prior to the arrangement, and the Quapaws were given poor and flood-prone land in Louisiana. Over the next six years, crop loss, starvation, the failure of the government to make good on its gifts and payments led to the eventual return of the Quapaws to the Arkansas valley, now living as squatters on marginal land near Pine Bluff. In 1833, the Quapaws signed yet another treaty to move to the northeastern corner of Oklahoma, leaving Arkansas Territory officially for a final time.

Both Osages and Quapaws appear to be relatively recent residents west of the Mississippi River, along with the Kansa and Omaha and other fellow speakers of the Dhegihan branch of the Siouan language group. Current research suggests that they emigrated from the Mississippi and Ohio River valleys between 250 and 500 years ago. Although the timing and reasons for this movement are still not clear, it is possible that ancestors of other Native tribes or nations resided in Arkansas when Europeans first arrived.

The Tunica occupied much of southeastern Arkansas when the earliest French explorers descended the Mississippi River at the end of the 17th century. They are the most likely early residents in the lower Arkansas River valley before the arrival of ancestral Quapaws. Within a generation, most Tunicas relocated down the Mississippi River, where they became important traders with European settlers during the 17th and 18th centuries.

Small bands of emigrants from several Native tribes and nations began moving west of the Mississippi River in the years just before the Louisiana Purchase, a trickle that became a substantial movement until the late 1820s when the U.S. government gave up on plans to use Arkansas as an area to re-settle eastern Indians and Arkansans succeeded in removing all Native settlements from the Territory. Some of the first to arrive were small bands of Shawnee, Delaware, and Kickapoo from the upper Midwest, and a few Cherokee bands from the newly independent United States. Welcomed by Spanish colonial authorities as a buffer against American intrusion and given permission by the resident Quapaws,

small settlements developed in the St. Francis River basin and on Crowley's Ridge. These newcomers resided in dispersed rural settlements of individual households with log dwellings and family garden plots with corn, beans, and other edible and medicinal plants. Hunting and foraging provided subsistence goods and desirable products for limited commercial trade at local establishments and elsewhere in the Mississippi Valley.

After the Louisiana Purchase and the arrival of American settlers and increasing numbers of Cherokee emigres, these Native residents moved into the White River valley and up some of the tributaries. Both natural and historic events accelerated this movement. The White River became accessible when the Osages relinquished their claim in 1809. The catastrophic New Madrid earthquakes a few years later, however, drove Natives and white settlers alike out of parts of Northeast Arkansas by making some land unusable and creating a lingering fear of future natural or supernatural catastrophes in the area. By this time there were reportedly up to 2000 Cherokees living in Arkansas. Some were retreating in advance of U.S. government pressure to remove from eastern homelands, while others left behind tribal turmoil and expectations to adopt American religious, economic and social practices.

With the permission of the Quapaws and U.S. authorities, Cherokees began settling in substantial numbers along the Arkansas River upstream from Little Rock. They were subsequently joined by some Delaware families, and white families with Cherokee ties. In 1817, the U.S. government made a treaty with some Arkansas Cherokee leaders and others to encourage Cherokee removal from their Georgia and Tennessee

homeland by setting up a large tract of land north of the Arkansas River to be exchanged for Cherokee land further east. The exact size and location of the tract was to be equivalent to the size of the parcel surrendered. Although the eastern boundary of this Cherokee reserve between the mouth of Point Remove creek and the White River a few miles from the future town of Batesville was surveyed years later, the western boundary of the reserve remained a contentious issue. Cherokee leaders felt that more good alluvial land along the north bank of the Arkansas River should be part of the reserve by amending the location of the reserve boundaries, and they felt that the size of the Arkansas reserve was smaller than the size of the tracts to be surrendered back east. The western border of the reserve began on the Arkansas River bank across from Fort Smith and was to run parallel to the eastern border to a point on the White River. The line was never officially established before the Arkansas Cherokees gave up their reserve for land in Indian Territory in 1828.

Despite continued intermittent hostilities with Osages, pressure applied by Federal and Territorial authorities, encroachment by whites into the Cherokee reserve, and unsettled relations with Cherokees east of the Mississippi, Arkansas Cherokees attempted to re-establish traditional communities along the Arkansas River and its tributaries up until the spring of 1828, when Washington pressure and a promise of assistance re-establishing themselves west of Osage and White annoyances secured signatures of Arkansas leaders to another treaty that extinguished the Arkansas Cherokee reserve and brought the removal of its Cherokee residents to Indian Territory. With the land reverting

back to the U.S. government and the quick arrival of large numbers of White settlers moving into the locations where the tribes had set up residence, Delaware and Shawnee communities soon retreated north to Missouri and elsewhere out of Arkansas.

Shortly after the U.S. government succeeded in designating part of Arkansas as a reserve for Cherokees, authorities established a second tract that covered much of southwest Arkansas and beyond for planned relocation of Choctaws from northeastern Mississippi and from a small number of scattered settlements west of the Mississippi River. The treaty of Doak's Stand in 1820 granted 13 million acres of western lands to the Choctaws. Unfortunately for government plans, Euroamerican settlers were already setting up homesites in the new Choctaw reserve, and both they and Arkansas territorial authorities wanted the land to remain available for sale to white settlers. While a small number of Choctaws who made a living by hunting and trade were interested in the new reserve, Mississippi Choctaws were not in favor of emigrating, especially into a situation where white settlers were already illegally settling on Choctaw land. Washington authorities were not interested in removing the white squatters, and settlers were unable to legally buy land from either the Choctaw Nation or the U.S. government. In 1825, Congress attempted a solution with another treaty in which Choctaws gave up their new land in Arkansas Territory and a formal boundary between Arkansas and the Choctaw land, still part of Arkansas's western border, was surveyed and marked. Southwest Arkansas was cleared of Indian ownership and the survey and sale of land to American settlers could proceed.

The U.S. government plans for Choctaw and Cherokee reservations to entice tribal members to leave their eastern homelands and establish peaceful coexistence between Indian residents and Arkansas Territorial authorities and citizens failed. This lent support to a different plan already in consideration for mandatory removal of Indians from east of the Mississippi and re-settlement west of fast growing American populations close to the northern border of Mexico, the area that became the independent nation of Texas in 1836. Starting in 1821, thousands of members of eastern Tribes passed through Arkansas, and continued to do so in the first decade of Arkansas statehood. There were tangible effects on this phase of Indian Removal for Arkansas leaders and residents. Roads were improved in anticipation of the thousands of people, horses, wagons, and other equipment that made up many removal groups. Hundreds of people received financial compensation for transporting removal parties on boats, ferries, and other conveyances, and for guiding removal groups. Some residents acquired contracts to provide food and other supplies for removal groups, others were paid for goods and services bought by travelling groups as they made their way to several destinations in Indian territory. A number of well-positioned or well-connected individuals made considerable profits.

The first removal parties to cross Arkansas were Choctaws, who had been selected by Washington authorities to be the first of the large Southeastern tribes to be legally and physically removed. In the 1830 Treaty of Dancing Rabbit Creek, Choctaws were given the option to move to a new tract of land sold to the tribe as a whole, or to remain in their homeland as citizens of Mississippi

subject to the legal and financial obligations of regular state residents. In the winter of 1831-2, most Choctaws who had opted to remove crossed the state. Some travelled by boat up the Arkansas or Ouachita rivers, most walked overland across south Arkansas from Memphis, Hopefield, and other river ports. Freezing weather, outbreaks of disease and poor provisioning made the removal especially difficult and brought about some changes in removal practices and procedures among both the removing tribes and the government planners. Many of those Choctaws who had remained behind in hope of becoming Mississippi citizens were unable to secure the promised financial awards or legal title to their lands, and more than a decade after Arkansas statehood, small parties of Choctaws made their way across the state to rejoin relatives on the Choctaw reservation in Indian Territory.

Plans were in place at this time for the removal of other Southeastern tribes whose members would travel across Arkansas, but financial and political issues, tribal resistance, logistical demands and the need to provide clear destinations for each tribe sometimes delayed the actual removal for years, and resulted in the movement of many removal of groups by various routes through the last years of Arkansas Territorial existence and into the early years of statehood.

The Chickasaws of northeastern Mississippi signed a removal treaty in 1832. Learning from the experiences of the Choctaws and others, Chickasaws financed and organized their own removal to a new homeland leased from the west portion of the new Choctaw reservation in southeastern Indian Territory. For several years, Chickasaw leaders, their agents, and other representatives passed

through Arkansas, planning transportation routes and provisioning strategies for people, wagons and their stock of thousands of horses. The main removal process took place shortly after Arkansas statehood in 1837.

Creek Indians resided in dozens of independent and widely distributed towns in eastern Alabama and western Georgia. Conflicts with encroaching settlers, governmental authorities, and some neighboring tribes kept portions of the Creek homeland in turmoil into the early 1800s, and brought internal divisions about removal and other issues that were exploited by government authorities. A large percentage of Creeks who had intermarried with White residents, and who had taken up many elements of western lifestyles, migrated to Indian territory in 1828 when the Creeks gave up their rights of land in Georgia. Creeks continued to move west, many in 1832 when the Alabama land of the Creeks was forfeit. The last major Creek removal was shortly before that of the Chickasaws, around the time of Arkansas Statehood in 1836, when the last reluctant Creeks were forcibly moved to lands in northeastern Indian Territory.

The largest and most widely known Tribal removal was the Cherokee 'Trail of Tears', the forced removal across several states, including Arkansas, in 1838 and early 1839. In actuality, some groups of eastern Cherokees began moving west as early as 1835 to join the "Old Settlers," formerly Arkansas Cherokees, who were re-establishing social and political institutions in northeastern Indian Territory since their own retreat west in 1828. In all, perhaps 20,000 Cherokees moved to Indian Territory.

The last of the major tribes to move through Arkansas were the Seminoles who had resisted government control until 1838. Between then and 1843, they were transported to Indian Territory, primarily by boat.



What is now Arkansas existed for more than 12,000 years as the domain of numerous Native American groups. Throughout the colonial era, Arkansas remained a “native ground” within which immigrant French, Spanish, and American settlers—vastly outnumbered despite indigenous population declines—became integrated as part of American Indian economic, social, and political institutions. Greatly different circumstances developed following the Louisiana Purchase. Land cessions forced upon indigenous Caddos, Osage, and Quapaws, and voluntary relocations on the part of Tunica communities, opened large tracts for temporary settlement by other tribes moving out of the Midwest and interior Southeast.

Throughout the Territorial period, groups of Delawares, Shawnees, and Kickapoos, along with Cherokees, Choctaws, and Chickasaws, took up residence across various parts of Arkansas. Within a generation, and despite many examples of successful community development, they, too, were forced to relocate farther west as increasing numbers of white Americans also arrived. The final groups to traverse Arkansas, during a few short years following statehood, included Cherokees, Chickasaws, Choctaws, Creeks, and Seminoles forced into final removal from eastern homelands for resettlement in the recently established Indian Territory in what today is Oklahoma. The legacies

of all of these tribes and nations for their time in Arkansas remain accessible in oral traditions, in primary historical documents, and in the ground.



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STATEHOOD AND STATE BANKING

Arkansans did not begin to think seriously about statehood until the early 1830s, when the population of the territory began to increase rapidly and rising cotton prices suggested that a bright future awaited. The stimulus for action came in 1833 when Michigan Territory moved to enter the Union as a free state, opening the way for a new slave state to be accepted. Arkansas rose to the occasion, and on June 15, 1836, became the 25th state of the United States. Meanwhile, along with the rest of the country, it enjoyed an economic boom. Between 1832 and 1833, land sales in Arkansas jumped from 10,000 acres to 42,000 acres. In 1834 the number went up to 151,000 and in 1835 it soared to 630,000 acres. A pound of cotton that had sold for about 8 cents in 1832 was selling for 15 cents in 1835. Southerners moved into the Arkansas Delta and put their slaves to work with the expectation of growing wealthy.

Armed with the sovereignty that came with statehood, the political leaders of Arkansas founded two banks, hoping to benefit from the availability of local credit, most of them planning to use it to buy more land and more slaves. Then came the Panic of 1837, one of the economic crashes that occurred every twenty years or so during the Nineteenth Century, which in this case brought nearly a decade of hard times and left Arkansas with severe financial problems that lasted to the Civil War and beyond. The story of the state's quarter-century experiment with state banking is a complex tale too long to be told here, but a synopsis of what happened

placed within the context of the time may provide readers with a better understanding of the early history of our state and perhaps some insight into its long-term economic problems.



The first public discussion of statehood began in 1831 as part of a dispute between the two political factions fighting for control of territorial government. Robert Crittenden, the former territorial secretary, had lost influence in 1827 when he shot and killed Henry W. Conway, the territorial delegate to Congress, in a duel. Ambrose Sevier, Conway's cousin, was elected delegate and began building a political organization that soon merged with the Jacksonian Democratic Party and went on to dominate Arkansas for most of the antebellum period. In addition to his Conway relatives from Tennessee, Sevier's close allies were the attorney Chester Ashley and William Woodruff, owner of the *Arkansas Gazette*. Crittenden's friends became an opposing faction that over time turned into the Whig Party of Arkansas. In the spring of 1830, Charles Bertram, a Crittenden ally, started publishing the *Arkansas Advocate*, and partisans of each side began to attack each other in the newspapers, often using pseudonyms to minimize the need to fight duels over their nasty personal insults. One writer in the *Advocate*, who called himself Aristides, attacked John Pope, the Jackson-appointed territorial governor, on a regular basis. At one point, Aristides railed against the "vassalage" of territorial government itself,

saying it was “a state of abject servitude” when compared with the “community of free men” that came with statehood. A writer who styled himself Henry, but who probably was Governor Pope himself, responded to Aristides in the *Arkansas Gazette*. He pointed out that Arkansas did not have the necessary population to make it eligible for statehood and at the present could not meet its bills, even though the national government was paying the salaries of the governor, the secretary, and the judges of the superior court, as well as building roads that were desperately needed. The Crittenden forces continued to argue that statehood should be pursued as soon as possible.

In April 1831, Territorial Delegate Sevier elaborated on Henry’s themes. With respect to the fiscal problem, he suggested that “taxed high and deeply in debt” Arkansas would be better off to remain as a territory for a few years. He gave no details about territorial finances, but six months later, in November 1831, a biannual audit revealed that Arkansas had collected over \$14,000 in revenue but was still in debt for over \$9,000 of scrip that it had issued as a medium of exchange and was still in circulation. Sevier also emphasized the importance of internal improvements. Over the last decade Congress had funded roads from Memphis to Little Rock, from Little Rock to Ft. Gibson in Indian Territory, from the Missouri border in the north east to Washington in the southwest, and from Columbia in Chicot County across the southern part of the territory to Fulton on the Red River. Once Arkansas became a state, Congress would cease paying for its transportation projects unless they were part of a national program. While Sevier did not say so, that was unlikely to be the case; just a year earlier, President Jackson himself

had vetoed a congressional appropriation to assist in the construction of the Maysville Road, sixty-six miles of turnpike in Kentucky that would have linked up with the National Road that connected the east coast with the Ohio River.

Given his stated position in 1831, it surprised his constituents when they learned that in December 1833, Ambrose Sevier had asked the House of Representatives’ Committee on Territories to begin the process of Arkansas becoming a state—which required an enabling act allowing it to hold a convention and write a constitution that would be submitted to Congress for its approval. As Sevier explained, it was sectional politics that had changed his position. Michigan Territory had indicated that it wanted to apply for statehood as a free state, and under the Missouri Compromise Congress would have to balance that with a slave state. If Arkansas did not step up, Florida might, and in that case, Arkansas might have to wait another twenty-five years for Wisconsin to apply. Sevier was confident that Arkansas’ population was increasing fast enough to make statehood a possibility and noted that as the new settlers bought land, “additional objects of taxation are daily multiplying.” Soon the territory would be “wholly unembarrassed with debt.” With respect to internal improvements, he predicted that many transportation projects would be completed in the year or two before the statehood process was completed.

Most Arkansas Democrats found Sevier’s arguments convincing, and the Whigs were happy to go along with what they had long advocated. Congress, however, proved to be a problem. The national Whig party was strongly opposed to admitting Arkansas and Michigan because they assumed that

both frontier territories would vote for the Democratic candidate in the presidential election of 1836. Neither in the first session of the 23rd Congress that ended in March 1834, nor in the second that ended in March 1835, were the Democrats able to pass the enabling acts necessary for Michigan and Arkansas to call constitutional conventions. Frustrated by the delay, Michigan decided to write a constitution on its own authority and present it for approval. Sevier immediately urged Arkansas to do the same thing.

In other respects, the 23rd Congress had been very good to Arkansas. It made available \$100,000 so that Henry Shreve could begin removing the Red River Raft, 150 miles of fallen trees and vegetation that impeded steamboat navigation, which when cleared would open southwest Arkansas and northwest Louisiana to cotton farming. Another appropriation provided \$106,000 to rebuild forty-seven miles of the Memphis to Little Rock Road between the Mississippi and St. Francis Rivers that flood waters made nearly impassable almost half of the year. The project involved building an embankment to raise the level of the road through what was known as the Mississippi Swamp, but Sevier was confident that it would be done within a year, allowing four-horse carriages to travel between the two cities three times a week in all seasons. In addition, Congress allocated small amounts of money to complete a modest network of roads in Arkansas and provided \$40,000 to improve navigation on the Arkansas River.

During the summer of 1835, Arkansas commissioned a census to determine the size of its population, and it put a question about statehood on the ballot used to elect legislators for the fall session of the Assembly. Voters approved moving forward

by a two to one majority, and over the objection of territorial governor William Fulton, who thought the constitution-in-hand approach was illegal, the legislature organized a December election for delegates to a constitutional convention that would begin on January 4, 1836. On that same day, Governor Fulton reported that the census showed the state had 52,240 people, of whom 9,838 were enslaved¹. Statehood required 47,700 people, this number being the average number of constituents needed for each member of the House of Representatives, based on the Census of 1830. The 47,700 figure did not directly reflect to the actual number of individuals in a legislative district; instead, it was a “federal number,” meaning that all white people were included but only three-fifths of the enslaved. Arkansas had 42,402 whites and 9,838 blacks; the latter counted as 5,903, making Arkansas’s federal number 48,305—605 larger than necessary.

The convention finished its work on January 30 and sent a copy of the proposed constitution to Washington by special messenger. It embodied the democratic values of the time, for example by giving the vote to all free white men over the age of 18, and in general was similar to those of other states. The growing political influence of cotton planters was reflected in a provision that denied state government the right to free enslaved people without the permission of their owners. An important provision, it would later turn out, called for the creation of two banks. One was a state bank that would serve as a repository for public funds and was “required to loan them out throughout the State and in each country according to its population.” The second was a privately-owned corporation

designed to “promote the great agricultural interests of the state.” While banks normally raised money by selling shares, this one would follow a “Plantation Bank” model first used in Louisiana in 1828, which allowed individuals to buy stock by mortgaging their agricultural property. Capital for the bank was to come from bonds issued by the state and backed by its “full faith and credit.” Stockholders could borrow money up to one-half of the value of their mortgages.

In the Spring of 1836, a Congressional battle over the Michigan and Arkansas constitutions was intensified by the looming president election. As the Whigs struggled to delay approval, the venerable John Quincy Adams, now in the House of Representatives, attacked the Arkansas provision that he claimed would protect slavery “in perpetuity.” Nevertheless, the Democrats won, and Andrew Jackson signed the bill declaring Arkansas a state on June 15, 1836. Territorial government continued while a new legislature and state officers were elected and ended only on September 12 when Governor James S. Conway addressed the General Assembly in the new Arkansas statehouse and proclaimed that “the date of our existence, as a free and independent state, has commenced.”

The Arkansas legislature wasted no time in taking advantage of their constitutional right to create banks. Within a month of his inauguration, Governor Conway had signed a law creating a private corporation known as the Real Estate Bank of Arkansas. The main office was in Little Rock, but there were branches in Hempstead, Phillips, and Chicot Counties to serve the planters on the Red River and in the Delta. The bank was provided with a potential capital of \$2 million, which would come from the sale of

2,000 bonds each worth \$1,000, carrying an interest rate of five percent, and inscribed: “The State of Arkansas acknowledges to be indebted to the Real Estate Bank of Arkansas, in the Sum of \$1,000.” Only citizens of Arkansas who owned land in the state could become stockholders and only by mortgaging acreage and improvements within the state. As stockholders, they were eligible to borrow half the amount of their mortgage. Once a bond was sold, the bank was responsible for paying its principal and interest to the new owner. Left unsaid was the legal reality that if the bank was unable to meet that obligation, the State of Arkansas was responsible for doing so. Nor did the state have any meaningful control over the bank. The governor appointed only two of its nine directors, and legislative oversight was limited to a summary report given by the Board of Directors to the General Assembly every two years.

A second financial institution was created at the same time, this one a public corporation officially titled Bank of the State of Arkansas but always referred to as the State Bank. Its purpose was to serve as a repository for state funds, such as tax revenues and the five percent share of the profits from federal land sales that was part of the statehood settlement. It also sold state bonds in the same manner as the Real Estate Bank. Using this capital, the bank made loans in the form of bank notes issued in denominations as low as \$5.00. The central office was in Little Rock and there were branches in Batesville, Fayetteville, and Arkansas Post.

Arkansas entered the banking business at a very bad time. After refusing to recharter the Second Bank of the United States in 1832, President Jackson had distributed federal funds among a selected group of institutions

known as “pet banks.” In the same month it made Arkansas a state, Congress passed a Surplus Funds Act requiring those banks to turn over a large amount of that money to the states and to do so in the form of gold and silver coin. The next month, Jackson, worried about a proliferation of bank notes associated with the economic boom, issued the Specie Circular, which required land offices to accept only hard money in payment for public lands. These two measures did not cause the ensuing Panic of 1837, which was created by other national and international events, but they were the catalyst that began it. The specie requirement raised the price of land, and the distribution act weakened banks that had to give up the hard money that supported the paper notes they had in circulation. As land sales fell off and banks failed, commodity prices went down, manufacturing slowed, unemployment spread, and the nation entered a depression that lasted nearly a decade. Arkansas land offices sold a record 960,000 acres in 1836, 290,000 in 1837 and a meager 157,000 in 1838. When details of the federal fund distribution were announced in January 1837, the state was to receive \$382,000 to be paid in specie, but the banks in New Orleans and Natchez (from where the money was to come) were unable to provide all of it. Arkansas collected only \$286,000 and only \$90,000 of that was hard money.

In the fall of 1840, when state auditor Elias N. Conway delivered his annual report on state finances, there was good news and ominous news. An increase in population and wealth had given the state net revenue of \$117,000 over the previous two years, and after paying all its bills Arkansas had \$18,000 in the bank. On the other hand, the state had provided its new banks with 3,660

bonds, and they had sold 2,676 of them, creating a debt of \$2,676,000 with an annual interest payment of \$159,000. Archibald Yell, the new governor, indicated some concern and recommended the legislature look into the situation.

Over the next two years, disaster struck. Speaking to the State Assembly about the banking system in November 1842, Yell was blunt: “The developments, glaring and startling, of the demoralizing and ruinous consequences of the present system, demand at your hands a radical reform.” Six months earlier, the Real Estate Bank had ceased operations and turned over its assets and liabilities to fifteen trustees who were to settle its accounts. It claimed to have \$2.4 million in assets, but they were in the form of hard-to-collect loans backed by mortgaged agricultural assets that had greatly decreased in value. The liabilities were more concrete, consisting mostly of 1,530 bonds on which the interest had been paid up to July 1, 1841.

The bank had also used 500 bonds as collateral for a loan of \$250,000 from the North American Trust and Bank headquartered in New York City. North American Trust had then signed over the bonds to James Holford and Company of London as security for its own loan of \$350,000. When North American could not pay Holford, the London bank called on the Real Estate Bank to redeem the bonds, but it refused, claiming North American had violated an agreement not to give the bonds to anyone else. Holford then asked Arkansas to pay, but Governor Yell also refused, arguing that the Real Estate Bank charter gave it the right to sell state bonds but not to use them as security for a loan.

In 1846, Governor Thomas S. Drew gave a succinct and understated assessment of the situation: “The financial history of the state exhibits a series of blunders.” The Real Estate Bank trustees had redeemed 29 of the company’s outstanding bonds, but the governor believed that the remaining principal and accumulated interest along with the Holford bonds amounted to \$2.1 million in liabilities. The amount of its assets had still not been determined. The State Bank had gone out of business in 1843, a victim of mismanagement and embezzlement, as well as the national financial climate. Drew feared that its losses would turn out to be larger than those of the Real Estate Bank. On the bright side, tax revenues were keeping the state solvent, although while the state’s population had grown from 97,000 in 1840 to 145,000 in 1846, less money was being collected because many people could not afford to buy land and others to pay their taxes.

Banking problems continued through the rest of the antebellum period, but the state made progress in dealing with them. In 1860, Governor Elias Conway announced that the state had redeemed 631 of the 1,530 bonds sold by the Real Estate Bank and owed only \$1.6 million in principal and interest. It had also paid off nearly \$1 million of the State Bank debt. The economy of the state was in good shape, and he believed it could continue the repayment process without raising taxes. The Real Estate Bank still held mortgages on the land that was now much more valuable than it had been, and Conway thought the debt could be wiped out if the state sold it. Given that the owners of mortgaged land were powerful men and doubtless some of them were serving in the legislature, it doubtful that the governor’s plan would have been implemented, but the

Civil War intervened before that could be put to a test.



As Conway seemed to suggest, the consequences of Arkansas’ banking failures were less severe than might have been expected. Other states had the same problems and some of them repudiated their debts, which, except for the Holford bonds, Arkansas did not do until after the Civil War. In general, the agencies outside the state which lost money were financial institutions whose business involved accepting that sort of risk. Inside the state, it is not clear that much damage was done, since the Real Estate bank never foreclosed on its mortgages and the State Bank never auctioned off its own assets as some suggested it do. The 1850s were instead a period of growth and relative prosperity during which the state’s population climbed to 435,000, among whom were 111,000 slaves, most of them producing cotton for planters who sold it for up to 12 cents a pound. Had it not been for the Civil War, by 1870 the Arkansas Delta would have been dotted with the graceful mansions that were common in other parts of the Cotton Kingdom.

The real cost of the banking debacle was a lost opportunity for economic development of a commercial or even manufacturing nature. The reconstruction of the Memphis to Little Rock Road, that might have boosted the fortunes of the capital city, was never finished. The Army engineer supervising it ran out of money in 1838, and Arkansas never had the cash, the credit, or perhaps the will, to finish the job. Some state leaders, among them Absalom Fowler, William Woodruff, Albert Pike, Roscoe

Beebe and C.C. Danley, recognized the value of internal improvements and did much to promote them. They took the lead in calling for the Commercial Convention that met in Memphis in 1845, hoping that the Little Rock to Memphis road would be funded as part of a regional transportation network. Four years later they did the same for the Railroad Convention that also met in Memphis, this time fighting for a trans-continental railroad that would pass through Little Rock. Arkansas promoters, however, were always beggars, looking for federal funds or asking the prosperous business community in Memphis to invest in their projects. Moreover, most state leaders were either content with the existing economy or unwilling to take further risks to improve it. In 1846, the General Assembly eliminated the possibility of future capital development with a constitutional amendment stating that “no bank or banking institution shall be hereafter incorporated, or established, in this state.” When, in 1853, the federal government offered the state a generous grant of land to use as an incentive for private companies to build railroads, Governor Conway refused to call a special session of the Assembly to put the program in motion, and the opportunity was lost.

Southern planters were always leery of spending money on public projects that did not provide them with credit or help get their crops to market, so even without the bank failures not much economic development might have taken place. Nonetheless, the antebellum experience left the postbellum state with a heavy debt and cultural baggage that feared risk more than it strove for economic progress.



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“A HARNESSED REVOLUTION”: RECONSTRUCTION IN ARKANSAS

The era of Reconstruction was one of the most tumultuous and controversial periods in Arkansas’s history. The term “Reconstruction” actually applies to several distinct but related aspects of the immediate post-Civil War period. **Political** Reconstruction dealt with the process of determining how the seceded states would resume their place in a reunited nation and who would control the political fortunes of those states. **Economic** Reconstruction concerned the attempts by white Southerners to recover economically from the devastation of the war, by black Southerners to establish their economic viability in the free labor system, and by the Reconstruction governments to reshape the South in the economic image of the North. **Social** Reconstruction involved the process of determining how the former slaves and former masters would interact in the new social arrangements brought on by the war and emancipation. The overlapping and intertwining of these various aspects made Reconstruction a complex and confusing era.

The process actually began in late 1863, when President Lincoln issued his Proclamation of Amnesty and Reconstruction, often referred to as the “Ten Percent Plan.” That plan offered a “full pardon . . . with restoration of all rights of property, except as to slaves” to all rebels who would take an oath of future loyalty to the Constitution and agree to abide by acts of Congress and Presidential proclamations regarding slavery. Only high-ranking

Confederate leaders were excluded from this policy, and they could apply for pardons to the President on an individual basis. When the number of people taking the oath reached ten per cent of those who had voted in the election of 1860, those citizens could form a new state government, which the President would recognize. In the case of Arkansas, that meant that the process of forming a new state government could begin when only slightly over 5,400 persons took the oath.

Following the announcement of the President’s plan, Arkansas Unionists began taking the required oath and by early January 1864, the ten percent requirement was met. That same month, Unionists from twenty-four of the state’s fifty-seven counties assembled in Little Rock to draft a new constitution. The new document was similar to the state’s first constitution of 1836, except for a provision abolishing slavery. The convention also chose a provisional slate of officers. The document and slate of officials were submitted to the voters in March of 1864.

The election was in no way a truly statewide or representative affair. Confederate forces still controlled portions of southern and southwestern Arkansas, and much of the state outside of the major population centers was still a virtual no-man’s land. With only slightly more than twelve thousand Arkansans casting ballots, the document was overwhelmingly approved, a slate of provisional state officials chosen, and a new state legislature elected. Fittingly, Isaac Murphy, the lone holdout against secession

in the state convention of 1861 and a man whose devotion to the Union had not wavered during the trying months and years thereafter, was elected governor.

Murphy worked diligently to promote reconciliation and to prepare the state for its return to the Union. But the problems facing the new administration were staggering. As Murphy noted in his inaugural address, the loyal state government began “under very embarrassing surroundings; without money power, without military power.”

The end of the war in April 1865 created additional problems. The assassination of President Lincoln removed the architect of the lenient plan of Reconstruction and destroyed the South’s best hope for peaceful reunification. While his successor, Andrew Johnson of Tennessee, pursued a plan very similar to that proposed by the slain president—repudiation of secession and the Confederate debt, abolition of slavery, and ratification of the Thirteenth Amendment—he lacked Lincoln’s stature and political skills and soon found himself at war with Congressional Republicans.

The return of Confederate troops who had fought east of the Mississippi River threatened to add to the opposition that the Unionist state government faced. The previous year, in an attempt to head off this threat, the Unionist state legislature had passed a law requiring a second loyalty oath as a prerequisite for voting. To be eligible, a person had to swear that he had not supported the Confederacy since the establishment of the loyal state government. With this provision in place, the Murphy government felt confident enough to call for congressional elections in October 1865.

With many former Confederates disqualified, fewer than seven thousand voters cast ballots. Still, the opposition party, composed largely of prewar Democrats and some former Whigs and styling itself as the Conservatives, made a surprisingly strong showing. The administration soon received additional doses of bad news. First, the national Congress, citing the low voter turnout, refused to seat the newly elected congressmen. Then, in the case of *Rison et al v. Farr*, the state supreme court struck down the state’s loyalty oath as unconstitutional. In the state elections of 1866, the Conservatives swept away almost the entire Unionist ticket elected in 1864 and returned power to many of the same people who had run the state before the war. Murphy survived only because his term was not up until 1868.

The old planter elites also sought to restore their prewar economic status. Most had retained control of their land, but with slavery gone, they now had to bargain for the labor of their former slaves. A variety of labor arrangements ensued, but over time, a system called sharecropping emerged as the most popular form. Under this system, a landowner rented a plot of land to an individual to farm independently and furnished everything necessary to grow a crop. The owner would then receive a share of the crop (generally about one-half) as rent. The task of supervising these contracts between planters and laborers and of providing food, shelter, education, and justice to the former slaves fell to a federal agency called the Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen, and Abandoned Lands, more commonly known as the Freedmen’s Bureau. The Bureau began operations in Arkansas in June 1865. In the period

immediately following the war, Arkansans turned again to cotton as their major money crop, but poor harvests in the two years after the war threatened the economic viability of planters and sharecroppers alike.

As the antebellum elites struggled to maintain their economic viability, other events threatened their political hegemony. In April 1866 Congress enacted, over the President's veto, a Civil Rights Act which defined all persons born in the United States as citizens and provided a federal guarantee for the "full and equal benefit of all laws and proceedings for the security of person and property" regardless of race. A short time later, Congress approved the Fourteenth Amendment which voided all Confederate debts, prohibited states from violating the civil rights of any of its citizens, provided for a reduction in Congressional representation for those states which denied the vote to any adult male, and prohibited any person from holding a state or federal office who had at any time taken an oath to support the Constitution and subsequently supported the rebellion.

Only one former Confederate state (Tennessee) ratified the amendment. Both houses of the Conservative-dominated Arkansas legislature overwhelmingly rejected the proposal, and they were supported in this action by President Johnson, who was now engaged in a fierce struggle with the Radical elements in Congress for control of the Reconstruction process. The failure to guarantee the political and civil rights of the freedmen, the insistence on returning to positions of power in both the state and national government those who had only recently taken up arms against the United States, and the violence directed against freedmen and Unionists

combined with the President's combative intransigence to provoke an understandably sharp reaction among Northern moderates and to tilt the political balance of power in the direction of that body's more radical element. In so doing it doomed to failure the lenient plans of Presidential Reconstruction and the conciliatory policies of Governor Murphy.

Three months after Democratic-Conservative elements regained control of the Arkansas legislature, Republicans easily gained over two-thirds of the seats in both the U. S. Senate and the House of Representatives, assuring them of the ability to override Presidential vetoes. The views of the Radical element of the Republican Party, which had previously been in the minority, were now clearly the dominant sentiment. The fighting between the weakened President and an emboldened Congress continued throughout 1867.

In March of 1868, the House brought charges of impeachment against the President. The charges were more political than substantive, and the Senate narrowly failed to convict Johnson, but what remained of his power and influence were effectively destroyed. Arkansas and the rest of the former Confederate states, having missed an opportunity to adopt a conciliatory approach and perhaps reenter the Union under the lenient plan of Presidential Reconstruction, now would have to contend with a much harsher plan.

Under the terms of Congressional or "Radical" Reconstruction in 1867, the seceded states were divided into five military districts (Arkansas and Mississippi constituted the Fourth Military District), each under the control of a military

officer. The states were required to draft new constitutions providing for universal male suffrage and to ratify the Fourteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. Many former Confederates were disqualified from holding office or participating in the process.

In January 1868, seventy delegates assembled in Little Rock to draft the new state constitution. Forty-eight of the delegates could be classified as “Radicals” (sympathetic to Congressional Reconstruction), seventeen as “Conservative” (opposed to Congressional Reconstruction), and five as unaligned. The Radical element was composed of twenty-three Southern white delegates (dubbed “scalawags” by the Conservatives), seventeen white delegates from outside the South (called “carpetbaggers” by the Conservatives), and eight black delegates. Due largely to their greater unity of purpose, the white delegates from outside the South dominated the convention.

The deliberations were often contentious, but the document that emerged from this convention was, in many ways, a progressive charter. It gave black males the right to vote; recognized the equality of all persons before the law; forbade depriving any citizen of any right, privilege, or immunity “on account of race, color, or previous servitude;” and established a system of free public education. A popular vote on ratification and the election of new state officials was scheduled for mid-March.

The major issue in the campaign was the granting of full civil and political rights to black Arkansans. The election was marred by irregularities in voting, but the majority of eligible voters approved the charter. The new state legislature ratified the Fourteenth

Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, and Arkansas was officially readmitted to the Union on June 22, 1868.

The governor elected under the new state constitution of 1868 was thirty-four-year-old Powell Clayton, a former Federal cavalry officer from Kansas who had served with distinction at the battles of Helena and Pine Bluff. Clayton had been a Democrat before the war, but the growing hostility and violence directed against African Americans and Unionists in the immediate postwar period had caused him to turn against his former party. By 1867, he was active in the creation of the Republican Party in Arkansas. Unlike his conciliatory predecessor, Clayton viewed Reconstruction as little more than a continuation of the war (which in many ways it was), and he employed many of the same aggressive tactics he had used in that conflict.

Clayton and the Republican-dominated legislature hoped to accomplish several major objectives: to put an end to the widespread violence in the state, to implement the Republican program of protection of the civil and political rights of black Arkansans, to rebuild and diversify the state’s economy, to vastly expand the state’s railroad network, and to build a viable and lasting Republican Party in Arkansas. The governor used his appointive powers and the Republican-dominated state legislature to build a loyal base of supporters throughout the state.

The ratification of the 1868 Constitution and the election of Clayton and other Republicans to positions of power in the state was a devastating setback for Arkansas’s Conservative/Democrats.

Angered by the disfranchisement provisions of the new charter and frustrated by Republican control of the election machinery, many became convinced that their only hope for regaining control of the state government was through the use of extralegal means. Even as voters were going to the polls in March 1868, an organization was beginning to appear in Arkansas that would serve as a vehicle for the Democrats' attempt to regain control of the state government—the Ku Klux Klan.

Originally founded as a secret fraternal organization in Tennessee in the spring of 1866, the Klan soon became a paramilitary organization that employed terrorist tactics to intimidate or kill African Americans, Republicans, and other Unionists throughout the South. In Arkansas, the rise of the Klan coincided with the beginning of a massive campaign of terror and violence in all but the northwestern counties of the state in 1868. In August, Clayton began to organize the state militia. He rejected numerous requests for troops from voter registration officials around the state, but when the violence continued unabated, he declared that conditions made voter registration impossible in twelve counties, making it impossible to conduct a legal election.

Despite the violence and intimidation, Clayton managed to ensure that the state's electoral votes went to the Republican Ulysses Grant in the national election in early November. The day after that election, he declared martial law in ten counties and later extended the proclamation to include four more. The state was divided into four military districts (although little attention was paid to the northwest part of the state, where Klan activity was minimal), and the

militiamen were ordered to assemble at designated points.

Over the next five months, the Klan and militia forces clashed in the southwest, southeast, and northeast regions of the state, with both sides accusing the other of harming innocent civilians. The governor agreed to lift martial law for a county only when he was satisfied that law and order had been restored there. Crittenden County was the last in the state to see martial law lifted. When civilian control returned there on March 21, 1869, it marked the official end of what came to be called the Militia War.

Citizens in the areas under martial law lodged numerous complaints against Clayton's militia, ranging from theft to rape to murder. While it is clear that many of these charges were exaggerated or, in some cases, totally fabricated, the evidence of depredations by the militia is so widespread and so pervasive that it cannot be discounted. It is equally clear that Clayton's declaration of martial law and deployment of the militia, combined with the desire of many law-abiding Arkansans of all political persuasions for a return to law and order, contributed to the quick demise of the Arkansas Klan and the restoration of some semblance of civility. Historian Allen Trelease has argued that Clayton "accomplished more than any other Southern governor in suppressing the Ku Klux conspiracy." But the governor's actions also left a legacy of bitterness with many white Arkansans that severely undermined his attempts to build support for his party and its program in Arkansas.

The Republicans' plan for strengthening the economy also enjoyed mixed results. There were some significant successes, including

the establishment of a system of free public schools, the creation of a public university at Fayetteville, and the construction of more than 650 additional miles of railroad track. To pay for this economic development and for expanded government services, the legislature raised property tax rates and ordered the reassessment of real estate at market value. Historians have disagreed over the extent of the increase and the degree to which the new revenues helped the state; the program was beset by problems of inadequate finances, mismanagement, corruption, and intense political partisanship. That partisanship not only pitted Republicans against Democrats but also divided the Republican Party itself.

In the spring of 1869, a group calling itself the Liberal Republicans organized in opposition to the Clayton regime. They advocated an end to corruption, greater economy in government, the curtailing of the governor's powers, and an immediate end to all restrictions on voting rights for former Confederates. Even after Clayton moved to the U.S. Senate in 1871, the infighting continued. In 1872, the Liberal Republicans nominated Joseph Brooks to run for governor. Brooks was an Ohio-born ordained Methodist minister who had served in Arkansas as the chaplain of the Fifty-sixth U.S. Colored Infantry during the war. With a voice "like a brindle-tail bull," he had been a dominant figure at the constitutional convention of 1868 and had supported Governor Clayton's employment of the militia in 1869 before later falling out with the governor. In 1871 Brooks announced his intention to seek the governorship in the 1872 election. He was a formidable candidate. His strong record on civil rights drew support from black Arkansans, and his platform of "Universal

suffrage, universal amnesty, and honest men in office" combined with his opposition to Clayton gave him strong appeal to many Democrats and Conservatives.

The Regular (pro-Clayton) Republicans responded by nominating Elisha Baxter. Baxter was a native of North Carolina who had moved to Batesville in 1852 and served two terms in the state legislature in the 1850s. His exact political position before the war is difficult to determine. Purported to be a Whig, he had supported Thomas Hindman in the elections of 1858 and 1860 but had opposed secession. When Federal forces occupied Batesville in 1862, he was offered a commission in the Union army but declined. When Confederate forces reoccupied the area, Baxter fled to Missouri where he took a job as a schoolteacher. In 1863 he was captured by a Confederate raiding party led by Col. Robert C. Newton and returned to Arkansas to stand trial for treason. Friends in Little Rock helped him to escape, and he began a long and dangerous flight to Union lines in Missouri, surviving on little more than corn and berries. Arriving in Springfield, he recruited a mounted infantry regiment and became its colonel.

After the fall of Little Rock to Union forces, Baxter served the Murphy government as a member of the state supreme court and was later elected by the Unionist legislature to the U. S. Senate, though the Radical-controlled body refused to seat him. Governor Clayton later appointed him as judge of the Third Judicial District. The platform of the Regular Republicans (often referred to as "Minstrels" after the previous occupation of one of their leaders) differed little from that of Brooks's "Brindletail" faction.

The nomination of Brooks and Baxter by the opposing factions within the Republican Party began one of the most confused and confusing episodes in all of Arkansas history. As Michael Dougan has noted, “That [the] carpetbagger Brooks ran with Democratic and scalawag support against a scalawag nominated by a Party composed almost exclusively of carpetbaggers was enough to bewilder most voters as well as the modern student.” Brooks’s oratorical skills gave him a great advantage, but Baxter had his own advantage: control of the election machinery. In the final analysis, it proved decisive.

The election in early November 1872 was marred by the now all too familiar pattern of fraud, intimidation, and stuffed ballot boxes. Returns from four counties were declared invalid and thrown out. “Official” returns revealed that Baxter had won by a vote of 41,681 to 38,415. Brooks’s partisans fiercely contested the results, but were frustrated in their attempts to have the election overturned. The legislature, dominated by Regular Republicans, failed to grant Brooks a hearing. Thus frustrated in the legislature, the Brooks forces turned to the courts. In June 1873 the state Attorney General initiated *quo warranto* proceedings against Baxter requiring the governor to prove the validity of his claim to the office. The Brooks forces hoped for a favorable ruling from the state supreme court, which was headed by Chief Justice John McClure, a former Clayton ally and appointee and a Brooks supporter. The court denied the writ over McClure’s dissent.

That same month, Brooks filed a complaint against Baxter in Pulaski Circuit Court claiming that Baxter had usurped the governor’s office without authority. In

response, Baxter filed a demurrer (a pleading that asserts that, even if the charges of the other party are true, they are insufficient to constitute a cause of action) and no further action was taken for a time. The Regular Republicans also retained control of the legislature, and Arkansas gave its eight electoral votes to President Grant.

In his brief inaugural, Baxter expressed the hope that his election would “mark the commencement of a new era of peace and good feeling in the history of Arkansas.” Noting that “[t]he disfranchisement of certain classes for participation in the rebellion is a great impediment in the way of restoring fraternal feeling among the people . . . [I]t is needless for me to say that I desire the immediate enfranchisement of those persons who are now denied a voice in the selection of their rulers.” He moved quickly to make good that pledge. An amendment restoring the vote was put to the voters in March 1873 and passed overwhelmingly. Thus Arkansas became the last state to remove voting disabilities on former Confederates.

The new governor appointed Democrats, Conservatives, and Liberals as well as Regular Republicans to government positions. After the legislature adjourned in April, a combination of gubernatorial appointments and resignations resulted in almost forty legislative vacancies, necessitating a special election in November 1873. The results reflected the changes wrought by the recent passage of the new franchise amendment. Democrats were elected to fill practically all the legislative vacancies, giving them control of the state legislature for the first time since the advent of Congressional Reconstruction.

Baxter continued to broaden his appeal to all factions, but in so doing he began to alienate his own base. Particularly offensive to Republicans of all stripes was the appointment of former Confederate colonel Robert Newton to head the state militia (the same Robert Newton who had arrested Baxter for treason in 1863). But despite their disapproval of many of his actions, Clayton and fellow U. S. Senator Stephen F. Dorsey continued to support Baxter.

The following year, however, a major schism occurred which severely threatened the future of the Baxter administration. Democratic success in the special election gave rise to a call for a special convention to draft a new constitution more in line with Democratic-Conservative principles. The prospect of a new charter that threatened to undo all that Republicans had worked for since 1868 sent shock waves through Republican ranks. When it became apparent that Baxter favored the calling of a convention, Senators Powell and Dorsey hastened to Little Rock to attempt to exert their influence on the governor.

That same month, Baxter announced that all the railroad bonds that had been issued by the Reconstruction government (including apparently \$400,000 worth that had been issued by him personally) had been issued in violation of the constitution; he indicated that he would not issue any more such bonds. One of the railroad companies affected by this order was closely associated with Senator Dorsey. Even more significantly, this action by the governor threatened to undermine the very foundation of the Republicans' plan for economic Reconstruction as well as the state's credit. For Dorsey and Clayton, this was the last straw. Deserting Baxter,

they allied themselves with Brooks and persuaded a friendly Pulaski County Circuit Judge to bring up the case of *Brooks v. Baxter* (filed ten months previously) and, on April 15, 1874, the judge declared Brooks the legal governor of Arkansas.

Brooks was sworn in by Chief Justice McClure, and shortly thereafter Brooks and over a dozen armed men marched to the statehouse and forced the startled Baxter to vacate the governor's office. Baxter and his supporters established themselves at the Anthony House, a local boarding house located less than three blocks east of the capitol near the intersection of Markham and Scott streets. There they laid plans to retake the office. Main Street became the dividing line between the two opposing forces, and federal troops served as a peacekeeping force in attempting to keep the two sides apart. Thus began the so-called Brooks-Baxter War.

Over the next few days, both sides organized militias, and Little Rock became an armed camp. Fighting between rival factions also took place at New Gascony (downriver from Pine Bluff) and on the Arkansas River near Palarm (near the present-day Faulkner-Pulaski county line). Finally on May 15, one month after the "war" had begun, President Ulysses Grant intervened, declaring his support for Baxter and ordering the Brooks forces to disband.

The following month, in the first statewide election since the end of restrictions on former Confederates, voters overwhelmingly approved the calling of a convention to write yet another new state constitution, and they elected Democrats to more than seventy of the ninety-one delegate positions. The document produced

by this convention strictly curtailed the governor's power and limited the state's power of taxation. In October, voters overwhelmingly ratified the new charter, elected Democrat Augustus Garland governor, and returned the state legislature to Democratic control by huge majorities in both houses. Reconstruction in Arkansas was effectively over.

The war, emancipation, and Reconstruction had been truly revolutionary experiences for the state and the region. But the return to power of the antebellum leaders ensured that Reconstruction was, in the words of Mississippi planter James Alcorn, a "harnessed revolution." Economic prosperity remained an elusive goal for most of the state's citizens, and the black population of Arkansas and throughout the South would have to wait for a "second Reconstruction" in the 1950s and 1960s to attain the full civil, political, and educational rights that the first Reconstruction failed to achieve.



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ARKANSAS'S ELECTORAL HISTORY

Arkansas's politics has been marked by the absence of two-party competition except in fleeting moments. For most of the state's history, the Democratic Party's dominance defined Arkansas. After a lightning-quick transformation in the Obama and Trump eras, however, that Democratic Party control has been replaced by a one-party Republican dominance in state politics with relatively small portions of the state remaining Democratic in voting loyalties. While some demographic changes hint at future changes in the state's electoral patterns, GOP control of the levers of political power in the state now appears relatively stable for the coming decade.

Even for the historically one-party Democratic South, the Democratic Party's control of Arkansas politics was cement-like until the last years of the twentieth century. Indeed, from the end of Reconstruction, even Republican presidential candidates were denied Electoral College votes every four years until Richard Nixon's 1972 victory. The Democratic Party's dominance of state and local elections (outside northwest Arkansas, which had housed Republicans since the Civil War era) was just as impressive. Indeed, few state political parties have experienced histories as frustrated as that of Arkansas's Republicans. Following the Democratic disenfranchisement of the state's African-Americans (most of whom identified as Republicans) in the last years of the nineteenth century, Arkansas's Republicans focused more on the gaining of patronage

from Republican administrations in Washington than in ardently contesting elections at home that would inevitably be lost. Until the 1990s, Republican victories in statewide elections were almost always attributable to Democratic failings rather than Republican ingenuity.

Before statehood, Arkansas politics was dominated by a small group of kin known by a variety of names, most commonly "the Family"; that clannish politics continued to express itself after statehood in 1836. The Johnson Conway Sevier Rector cousinhood accumulated 190 years of public office-holding, including two U.S. senators and three governors in antebellum Arkansas; other offices went only to their partisans. Because the Family was allied with President Andrew Jackson, Arkansas began its political life dominated by the Democratic Party. The opposing faction, which almost by default became associated with the Whigs, at times offered rather spirited opposition. Still, no one but a Democrat won the presidential or gubernatorial election in Arkansas in this era, and the only Whig elected to Congress, Thomas W. Newtown, filled several weeks of an unexpired term opened by Archibald Yell's resignation from the office in 1846.

During the Reconstruction era, a series of Republicans held the state's preeminent political offices, but the norm of Democratic rule returned immediately after Reconstruction's end in 1874. These "redeemers" shared a generally noninterventionist view of state government, with taxes, appropriations, and

regulations kept to a minimum. Frustration about the nonresponsiveness of government grew among farmers in the mid-1880s, as revealed by the growth of populist organizations such as the Farmers' Alliance and the Agricultural Wheel. With African-Americans still active electorally and generally voting for the Party of Lincoln, Republicans recognized in their growing numbers of white populists an opportunity to recapture power through coalitional endeavors. In 1888, they nominated no candidate of their own but instead backed Charles M. Norwood, gubernatorial candidate of the dissident Union-Labor Party; Democrat James P. Eagle defeated Norwood by only about 15,000 votes. For Democrats unaccustomed to genuine competition, this election was ominously close, especially because of the amount of obvious fraud that had been necessary to secure this narrow victory. A congressional election in the central portion of the state resulted in an even more marginal (and even more dubious) Democratic victory, one followed by the murder of the Republican candidate attempting to provoke a federal investigation of the voting process. In response, the political establishment saw to the enactment of a series of electoral "reforms," i.e. disfranchising measures, that emasculated the opposition and forced the emerging populist temper to participate within a one-party and generally issueless mold for the next six decades.

The Democrats elected as the state's delegates in the U.S. House and Senate were typically not challenged vigorously after being elected. As a result, these incumbents built up tremendous power in the legislative bodies, where seniority was highly valued. Senator Joe T. Robinson (who became Democratic majority leader), Congressman

Wilbur D. Mills (who became chair of the Ways and Means Committee), and Senators J. William Fulbright (longtime chair of the Foreign Relations Committee) and John L. McClellan (father of the McClellan-Kerr dam system) exemplify the power that the state had in Washington during this era.

While the first half of the twentieth century witnessed factionalized and chaotic battles in Democratic primaries for state offices, especially for the governorship, Governor Orval Faubus developed a dominant machine after his initial election in 1954. Faubus, who gained national notoriety for his attempts to block the desegregation of Little Rock's Central High School in 1957, used this powerful organization to gain an unprecedented six terms in office. Despite having appointed every member of every state board and commission, however, Faubus could not transfer his personal organization to other Democrats when he decided to retire in 1966 (Faubus later made three failed comeback attempts).

After disenfranchisement, the only portion of the state that contained significant numbers of white Republicans were the counties of northwest Arkansas, where Republican loyalties could be traced to the Civil War era. Arkansas Republicans became known as "post office Republicans" because, rather than putting energy into developing a political party to challenge Democrats in Arkansas, the activists simply filled the bevy of federal appointments (including postmaster positions) that came with Republican presidential victories. The small number of state legislators who identified themselves as Republicans during the first eight decades of the twentieth century came from these hill counties. It was in this quadrant of the state that

modern Republican development first evidenced itself. In 1966, Republican John Paul Hammerschmidt won a U.S. House seat from the area. He would not relinquish it until his 1992 retirement, often facing only token reelection opposition. Hammerschmidt's only truly close call came in 1974 (an electoral cycle where the Watergate crisis threatened all Republicans) when he beat back the challenge of upstart law professor Bill Clinton.

Also in 1966, the Democratic Party lost the governorship for the first time in the modern era. But the Republican candidate Winthrop Rockefeller differed dramatically from those in his party who began to be elected in other Southern states. Rockefeller was a racial liberal who developed a coalition of progressive Democrats disenchanted with the conservative Faubus machine, newly enfranchised African Americans, and traditional Republicans to gain the office and reelection in 1968 over Faubus protégés (he was joined in success by a victorious Lieutenant Governor candidate, Maurice "Footsie" Britt). Despite his electoral successes, Rockefeller failed to work successfully with the almost-totally Democratic legislature and could not advance his reformist agenda.

In 1970, the Democrats nominated for governor the unknown but telegenic progressive Dale Bumpers, rather than Faubus. Thus began a new era of dominance for the Democratic Party; its progressives returned home in Bumpers's easy victory over Rockefeller in the general election. African-American voters followed in subsequent elections, leaving the Republican Party in its traditional straits, except in the state's northwest corner. Rockefeller's death in 1973 devastated the

state's Republican party organizationally as it lost a patron committed to investing in the development of a two-party state. In many elections, Democrats—who spanned the ideological spectrum—won office without Republican opposition.

Bumpers was followed to the governorship, and later the U.S. Senate, by another progressive, David Pryor, a personable politician considered by many to be the most popular Arkansas politician of the contemporary era. Pryor served two terms as governor, from 1974 to 1978, before being replaced by a third politician in a similar mold, thirty-two-year-old Attorney General Bill Clinton. Except for the two years after his 1980 upset loss to Republican Frank White, Clinton served as governor until 1992, winning five general elections in a gubernatorial career equaled in tenure only by Faubus.

Bumpers, Pryor, and Clinton—termed by one observer the "Big Three" of modern Arkansas politics—developed separate, yet overlapping, organizations that hampered Republican Party development. No coherent state Democratic organization developed in this period despite the party's continued electoral success in state and local politics. The culmination of the state's progressive Democratic era was the elevation of Clinton in 1992 as the first president from the state.

Despite the success of Republican presidential candidates starting with Richard Nixon (in 1972), Republican success in state and congressional politics during the 1970s and 1980s was rare. A chaotic first administration for Democratic Governor Bill Clinton created an opening for Republican Frank White in 1980. In the campaign, White hammered Clinton's

support for increases in fees for car license plates and his inability to prevent the placement of Cuban refugees who later rioted at Fort Chaffee near Fort Smith and won an extremely tight election. Two years later, Clinton won a successful return to the office by defeating White. In 1978, Ed Bethune did gain a second congressional seat for the party, from the district covering central Arkansas, which he held for three terms.

In 1989, Bethune's replacement in Congress, Tommy Robinson, announced his switch to the Republican Party, becoming the party's highest profile capture of a Democratic officeholder. Soon thereafter, Robinson announced that he would challenge Clinton for governor in 1990. While Robinson had the support of national GOP leaders, he failed to win a Republican primary (open to voters of either party) over another party switcher, Sheffield Nelson. Clinton went on to defeat Nelson solidly in the general election and soon thereafter announced his candidacy for President in the 1992 election. In November of 1992, Clinton celebrated his victory on the steps of the Old State House in Little Rock.

Ironically, this ultimate triumph for the Arkansas Democrats led to the party's first lasting electoral difficulties in the modern era. Clinton's victory elevated Democratic Lieutenant Governor Jim Guy Tucker to the top of state government in late 1992; Tucker was elected governor on his own in 1994. However, in a successful prosecution connected to the investigation of Bill and Hillary Clinton's business dealings in Arkansas, Tucker was convicted by a federal jury in 1996 on a series of charges unrelated to his time as governor. Waiting in the wings to rise to the governorship after Tucker's

resignation was a Republican, the former president of the state Southern Baptist Convention, Mike Huckabee. Huckabee, coming off a loss for the U.S. Senate to Bumpers in 1992, had won a closely contested special election in the summer of 1993 to gain the lieutenant governorship and had won reelection in 1994.

The subsequent vacancy in the lieutenant governorship was won by another Republican, Winthrop Paul Rockefeller, the son of the late governor, in a 1996 special election. In contrast to the previous victories of Rockefeller and White, these Republican victories indicated an era of more stable success for the party in statewide politics. The Democrats' new electoral difficulties continued as they lost Pryor's Senate seat in 1996 as Republican Congressman Tim Hutchinson gained the position. The loss—on the same day as Bill Clinton's reelection as President—was historic: It meant Democrats failed to control both Senate seats from the state since the direct election of U.S. senators commenced. These newly successful Republicans of Arkansas had much more in common ideologically with Republicans elsewhere in the South than had the elder Rockefeller, generally exhibiting conservative positions on both economic and social issues.

Huckabee, who would win his own election as governor in 1998 and re-election in 2002, was the first Republican governor to share some of the personal dynamism of the "Big Three." His conservative populist ideology and savvy communication skills made him the first true state political "star" for the GOP in the modern era. Early suggestions were that Huckabee could become an effective proponent of Republican development in the state. However, while

his decade as governor presented grand opportunities to fill the hundreds of positions in the executive branch with Republican loyalists and to take on national Republican leadership roles, Huckabee evidenced less interest in building a strong Republican party organizationally.

Upon Huckabee's retirement (soon after which he began the first of two unsuccessful campaigns for the Republican presidential nomination), Democrats returned to dominance with a sweep of all state executive offices in 2006. Democrat Mark Pryor's recapture of his father's Senate seat in 2002 meant that five of six Arkansans representing the state in Washington were Democrats. Moreover, a plurality of Arkansans still identified as Democrats by the early years of the twenty-first century (39 percent, according to 2007 University of Arkansas's Arkansas Poll). The Arkansas Republican Party remained severely disadvantaged in the experience level of the candidates that it offered for most political offices in the state. This was shown most clearly in state legislative and local level offices, where Arkansas remained one of the most Democratic states in the nation into the twenty-first century. This Democratic legislative dominance persisted despite the implementation of the nation's most severe term limits provisions that disproportionately barred Democrats from continued service.

All this began to change, however, with the arrival of Democratic President Barack Obama on the political scene starting in 2008. Beating a former First Lady of Arkansas, Hillary Clinton, for the Democratic nomination in that year, a strong backlash against Obama was shown in the 2008 general election in Arkansas. This was particularly pronounced among

white rural voters living in the swath of counties running across the state diagonally from the southwest to the northeast corner of the state skipping over the Little Rock metropolitan area. These counties—termed the “rural swing” counties because of their propensity to swing back and forth in their voting patterns—rejected the nation's first African-American President with a ferocity not shown in previous GOP presidential wins in these areas. They joined overwhelming margins for Republican John McCain in the suburban counties around Little Rock and northwest Arkansas to provide him a 20-percentage-point margin in the state.

Previous GOP presidential success in Arkansas had not “trickled down” to lower levels of politics because of state Democrats' success in separating state politics from national politics and because of Arkansas Republicans' inability to consistently field candidates for state offices. That changed starting in the 2010 cycle as Republicans put forward candidates for three statewide offices beyond the governorship and in state legislative districts that had regularly gone uncontested. While Mike Beebe was able to separate himself from the anti-Obama sentiment in the state, winning all 75 counties in his reelection bid, the other three state contests (Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, and Commissioner of State Lands) were taken by Republicans and numerous Democratic legislative incumbents were tossed out in a year where the Democratic majority in the state House dropped from over 70 to just 55 seats. Republican Congressman John Boozman ousted two-term U.S. Senator Blanche Lincoln and two other Republicans won congressional seats given up by long-term Democratic incumbents who retired.

The challenges for Democrats became even more pronounced in the next two election cycles as President Obama (and his policies, particularly the Affordable Care Act) remained front and center. In 2012, Republicans gained control of both houses of the state legislature for the first time since Reconstruction, although the margin in the state House was eked out by only a handful of votes in one district. Many of the Republican legislative pickups came in traditionally “rural swing” districts which, by 2012, had become heavily skewed in a GOP direction, leaving behind their “swing” status. Exhibiting the role of the President in all such contests, one billboard in one such county in northeast read: “Save America. Vote Republican. Every Democrat Elected Helps Obama.” Arkansas’s Democrats lost another congressional seat as six-term incumbent Fourth District Congressman Mike Ross retired and was replaced by Republican newcomer Tom Cotton.

Things became even worse for Arkansas Democrats in the 2014 cycle. The most expensive campaign in the state’s history resulted in Cotton quickly rising to the U.S. Senate by easily defeating veteran Democrat Mark Pryor, the last member of his party in the Arkansas Washington delegation. The dynamics in that contest, driven once again by attitudes regarding President Obama, helped shape all other races down the ticket. The result: a Republican clean sweep of all six members of the congressional delegation, of all statewide offices including the election of Governor Asa Hutchinson, and additional gains in the state legislature. In the state House and Senate, Democrats were able only to maintain a hold onto districts in Pulaski County, the Arkansas Delta, and in college communities. Barack Obama’s retirement created a

perceived opportunity for Arkansas Democrats to begin their resurrection in 2016. However, bursting onto the political scene was Republican Donald J. Trump, a candidate with distinctive appeal with white rural voters feeling frustrations about their economic future. Trump won a surprisingly comfortable win in the March Republican primary in the state and then ran up huge majorities in the “rural swing” counties in the November general election. While Arkansas Democrats were more comfortable running alongside Hillary Clinton than had been the case with Obama, she lost by a wider margin than any Democrat since 1972 in a presidential race: Clinton, despite her Arkansas ties, won barely a third of the popular vote in Arkansas. The Republican domination led to a handful of additional pickups in the state House, giving the GOP a supermajority of more than three-fourths of the seats.

Republican control of the state’s politics in the coming years appears solid. Thus, once again, Arkansas has returned to one-party dominance, albeit with a different political party in control. That said, factional divides have been normal occurrences during periods of one-party control in the state and such divisions show themselves in the current Arkansas Republican party as an establishment wing battles a populist wing of the party. The divide takes on a clear geographical dimension as the establishment hails primarily from the suburban areas of Central and Northwest Arkansas while the populists are primarily rural in their origins. Led by Governor Asa Hutchinson, the establishment practices a form of pragmatic conservatism that follows the traditional rules of the game in carrying out the duties of government. Although quite conservative on social issues, the

establishment becomes deeply concerned when proposals such as anti-immigrant or anti-LGBT legislation threaten the business climate in the state. Populists express a desire to get immediate results on their priority issues, such as gun deregulation or religious freedom, even if it means shattering the traditional norms of how government operates. Because of the GOP's dominance in the state, all signs are that this division will be the key political battle in the state in the coming years, with those Republicans who find a way to bridge it holding distinctive power.

The only real threat to this Republican dominance is demographic change in northwest Arkansas, a still quick-growing area of the state. As the jobs for Northwest Arkansas-based companies have become more technologically sophisticated, a new type of in-migrant has emerged to fill them. Such knowledge-based professionals also help to support the emerging cultural offerings orbiting the mammoth Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art in Bentonville. Combined with a growing political mobilization of Latinos, the arrival of this new type of voter in northwest Arkansas creates possible opportunities for Democrats in both local and, and as result of the vote-richness of the region, in statewide contests. Still, for the foreseeable future, Republicans will clearly win more elections than they lose in state and congressional elections in Arkansas.

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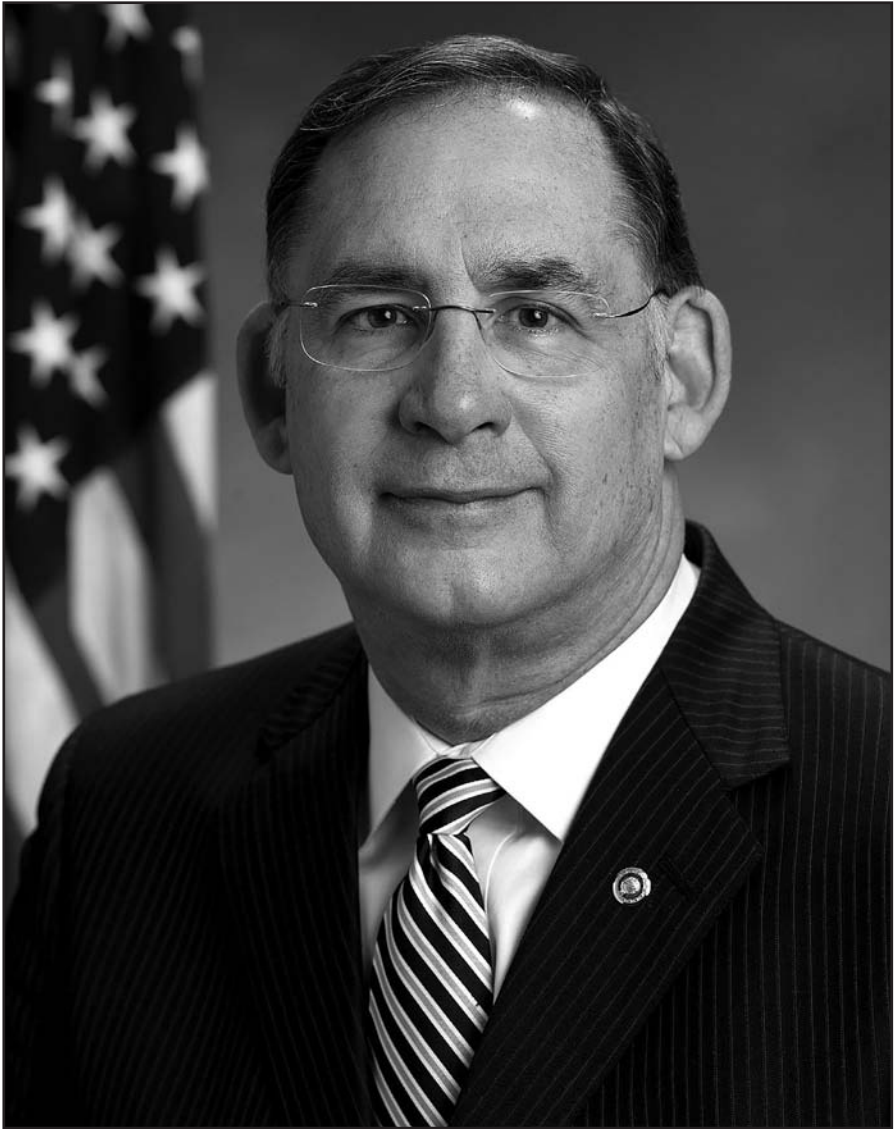

UNITED STATES SENATOR
John Boozman

John Nichols Boozman (born December 10, 1950), an optometrist and rancher, is the Republican senior U.S. Senator from the state of Arkansas. He was born in Shreveport, Louisiana, and raised in western Arkansas. He graduated from Northside High School in Fort Smith and played football for the University of Arkansas Razorbacks. He graduated from the Southern College of Optometry in 1977 and entered private practice that year in Rogers.

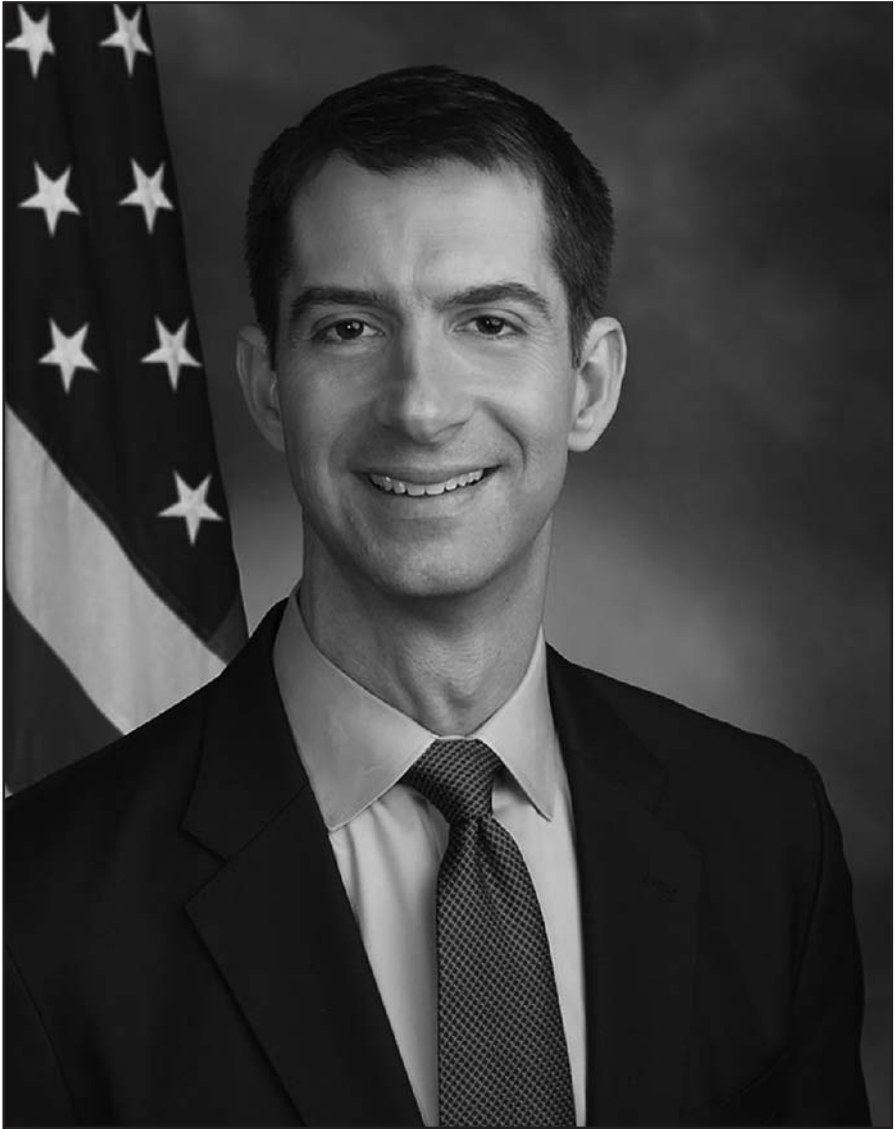
Prior to his election to Congress, Boozman served two terms on the Rogers Public School Board, established the low vision program at the Arkansas School for the Blind in Little Rock and worked as a volunteer optometrist in a clinic providing medical services to low-income families. He also served on the Benton County Fair Board and raised Polled Hereford cattle.

In 2001, Boozman was elected to Congress from Arkansas's Third District in a special election. In 2002, he ran unopposed for the seat and was re-elected in 2004, 2006

and 2008. In 2010, Boozman won the Republican senatorial primary in May and defeated sitting Senator Blanche Lambert Lincoln in the general election, winning nearly 58% of the vote.

Senator Boozman has served on Senate Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry, Environment & Public Works, Veterans' Affairs, Commerce, Science and Transportation and Appropriations committees, chairing three subcommittees. He also serves on the Commission on Security and Cooperation in Europe, (commonly referred to as the Helsinki Commission), and the Congressional Study Group on Europe (CSGE), which fosters dialogue between American lawmakers and their peers in European capitals. He also serves as one of six Congressional Regents on the Smithsonian Institute's Board of Regents.

Boozman is married to the former Cathy Marley. The couple has three daughters.



UNITED STATES SENATOR
Tom Cotton

Thomas Bryant Cotton (born May 13, 1977), a lawyer and former U.S. Representative, is the Republican junior U.S. Senator from Arkansas. He was born in Dardanelle (Yell County) and graduated from Dardanelle High School in 1995. He attended Harvard College and Harvard Law School where he received his Juris Doctor degree in 2002.

After a clerkship with the U.S. Court of Appeals, Cotton joined the United States Army as an Infantry officer. He spent nearly five years on active duty, completing combat tours in both Iraq and Afghanistan. In July 2010, Cotton transferred to the United States Army Reserve, while working as a political consultant. In 2012, he ran for a seat in the U.S. House of Representatives as a Republican in Arkansas's Fourth District, vacant as a result of the retirement of Democratic U.S. Congressman Mike Ross. Cotton won, defeating both Republican

primary challengers and a Democratic opponent in the general election. Cotton served a single term, opting in 2014 to challenge sitting U.S. Senator Mark Pryor. In November of that year, Cotton won with 56.5% of the vote.

As Senator, Cotton serves or has served on the Committee on Armed Services, the Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs, the Committee on the Budget, the Joint Economic Committee, the Special Committee on Aging and the Select Committee on Intelligence. He chairs the Armed Services Subcommittee on Air and Land Power and the Banking, Housing and Urban affairs Subcommittee on Economic Policy.

Cotton married attorney Anna Peckham in 2014. The couple has two children.



UNITED STATES REPRESENTATIVE

Rick Crawford

District 1

Eric Alan “Rick” Crawford (born January 22, 1966) is the Republican U.S. Representative for Arkansas’s First Congressional District. He was born at Homestead Air Force Base in Florida and grew up in a military family; he graduated from high school in Hudson, New Hampshire, then enlisted in the Army and served as an explosive ordnance disposal technician. After his service, he attended Arkansas State University and graduated in 1996 with a B.S. in Agriculture Business and Economics. Crawford pursued a career in broadcasting, working in both television and radio; he also operated an agricultural news service providing programming to radio stations in five southern states.

In 2010, Crawford sought the Republican nomination for U.S. Representative in Arkansas’s First District. Crawford won decisively in the primary, then won again with a comfortable majority in the general election. He has defeated Democratic challengers in subsequent contests.

Congressman Rick Crawford’s service has included membership on the House Committee on Agriculture, including subcommittees on Department Operations, Oversight, and Credit; General Farm Commodities and Risk Management (which he chairs); and Nutrition and Horticulture, and the House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, including the Subcommittee on Economic Development, Public Buildings and Emergency Management, the Subcommittee on Highways and Transit and the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment. He is also a member of the Republican Study Committee, a conservative caucus within the House’s Republican membership.

Rick Crawford and his wife, Stacy, live in Jonesboro with their children.



UNITED STATES REPRESENTATIVE
J. French Hill
District 2

James French Hill (born December 5, 1956) is the Republican U.S. Representative from Arkansas's Second Congressional District. Hill is a native of Little Rock, graduated from Little Rock's Catholic High School and from Vanderbilt University with a degree in economics, later attending the UCLA Anderson School of Management.

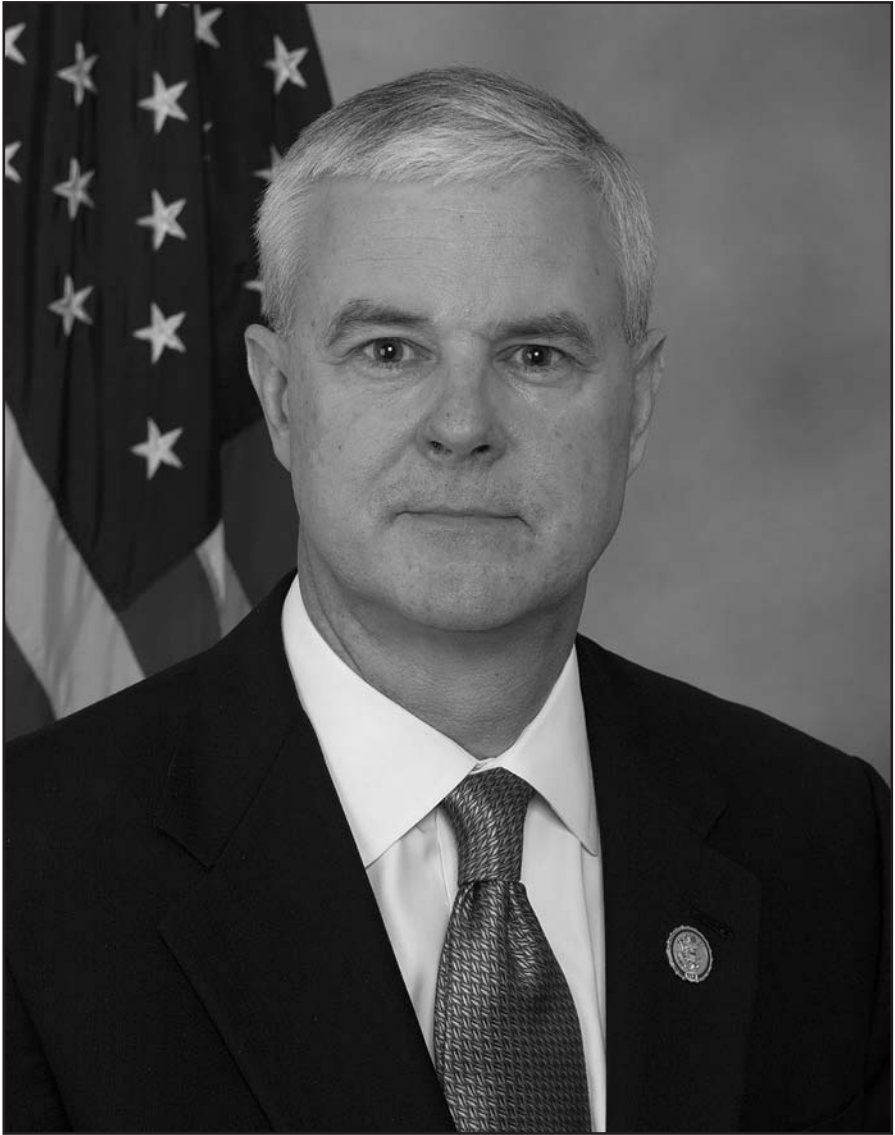
Hill's career has mixed banking with public service. He was a member of Texas Senator John Tower's staff from 1982 to 1984, also working for the U.S. Senate Committee on Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs. From 1989 to 1991 he served as Deputy Assistant Secretary of the United States Treasury, after which he was Special Assistant to President George H. W. Bush and Executive Secretary of the Economic Policy Council. At the end of the Bush administration, Hill entered the private sector, serving six years as an officer of Commercial Credit Corporation, then as CEO of Delta Trust

and Banking Corporation in Little Rock until its acquisition by Simmons First Bank in 2014.

In 2014, Hill sought the Second District U.S. House seat. Hill defeated Democratic candidate Patrick Henry Hays, the mayor of North Little Rock, 52 to 44 percent. In 2016, Hill faced and defeated a challenger in the Republican primary before besting both Democratic and Libertarian contenders in the general election.

Representative Hill serves on the House Committee on Financial Services and three of its subcommittees: Capital Markets, Securities, and Investment; Monetary Policy and Trade; and Terrorism and Illicit Finance. He is also a member of the Republican Study Committee and of the Congressional Arts Caucus.

French Hill is married to the former Martha McKenzie. They have two children and reside in Little Rock.



UNITED STATES REPRESENTATIVE

Steve Womack

District 3

Stephen Alan Womack (born February 18, 1957) is the Republican U.S. Representative from Arkansas's Third Congressional District. He was born in Russellville (Pope County) and graduated from Russellville High School in 1975. He graduated from Arkansas Tech University in 1979. After graduation, Womack enlisted in the Arkansas Army National Guard in which he served for 30 years, retiring in 2009 as a colonel.

Concurrently, he worked as a radio station manager, as executive officer of the Army ROTC program at the University of Arkansas and as a financial consultant in Rogers. He served two terms on the Rogers City Council and twelve years as mayor of Rogers.

In 2010, Womack opted to seek the Third District U.S. House seat. He finished first in the seven-candidate Republican primary and in the subsequent runoff election. In the general election, Womack faced Democratic

nominee David Whitaker and won with a decisive 72 percent of the vote. In 2012, 2014 and 2016 Womack faced no primary opponents and only minor-party challenges in the general elections.

As a Member of Congress, Womack has served on the House Committee on Appropriations and the House Committee on the Budget, as well as in subcommittees of both bodies. He is a member of the Republican Study Committee and of the International Conservation Caucus, a bipartisan Congressional group devoted to building public and private international partnerships that promote stewardship of natural resources for habitat and biodiversity protection, poverty reduction, economic development and security.

Steve Womack and his wife Terri have been married for thirty-three years; they have three grown sons and two grandsons.

Bruce Westerman
District 4

Bruce Eugene Westerman (born November 18, 1967), an engineer and forester, is the Republican U.S. Representative from Arkansas's Fourth Congressional District. He is a native of Hot Springs (Garland County); he graduated as valedictorian of Fountain Lake High School, then attended the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville, where he played football for the Arkansas Razorbacks. He graduated with a Bachelor of Science in engineering in 1990 and subsequently received a master's degree in forestry from Yale University.

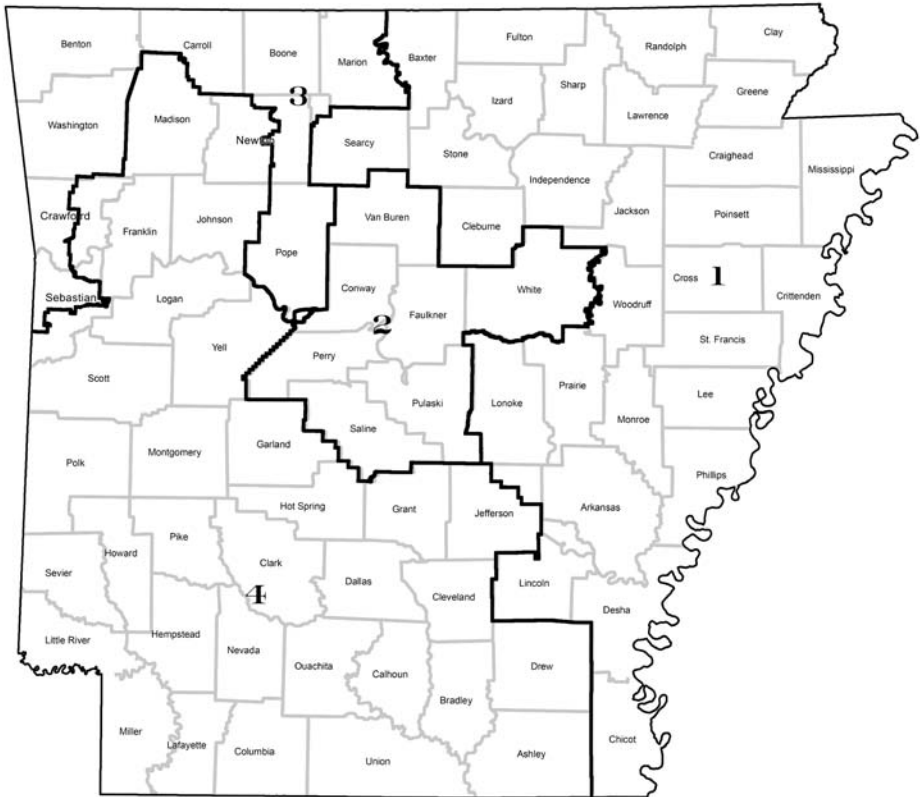
Westerman worked for twenty-two years at Mid-South Engineering in Hot Springs. He was named Engineer of the Year by the Arkansas Society of Professional Engineers in 2013. He served as president of the Arkansas chapter of the American Society of Agricultural and Biological Engineering. He is also a former chair of the Arkansas Academy of Biological and Agricultural Engineers.

Westerman ran for the Arkansas House of Representatives in 2010 without opposition. He won re-election in 2012, again without opposition in both primary and general contests. He served as House Majority Leader for the 2013-2014 session.

In 2014, Westerman won the Republican congressional primary and in the general election defeated Democratic nominee James Lee Witt with 54 percent of the vote. He has served on the House Committee on the Budget, the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, the Committee on Natural Resources and the Science, Space and Technology Committee, as well as subcommittees of these bodies. He chaired the Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations of the Natural Resources Committee during the 115th Congress. Like his Arkansas Congressional colleagues, he is a member of the Republican Study Committee.

STATE REPRESENTATION

At statehood, Arkansas's population merited a single member in the U.S. House of Representatives. As the state grew, so did its delegation. In 1850 and 1860 Arkansas added seats; by 1875 Little Rock returned an additional Representative "at large" and in 1880 one more district was added. 1890 and 1900 saw additional seats awarded so from 1903 to 1950 the state elected seven Representatives. Postwar population decline led a seat being lost in 1950 and two more in 1962, leaving Arkansas with four congressional districts.

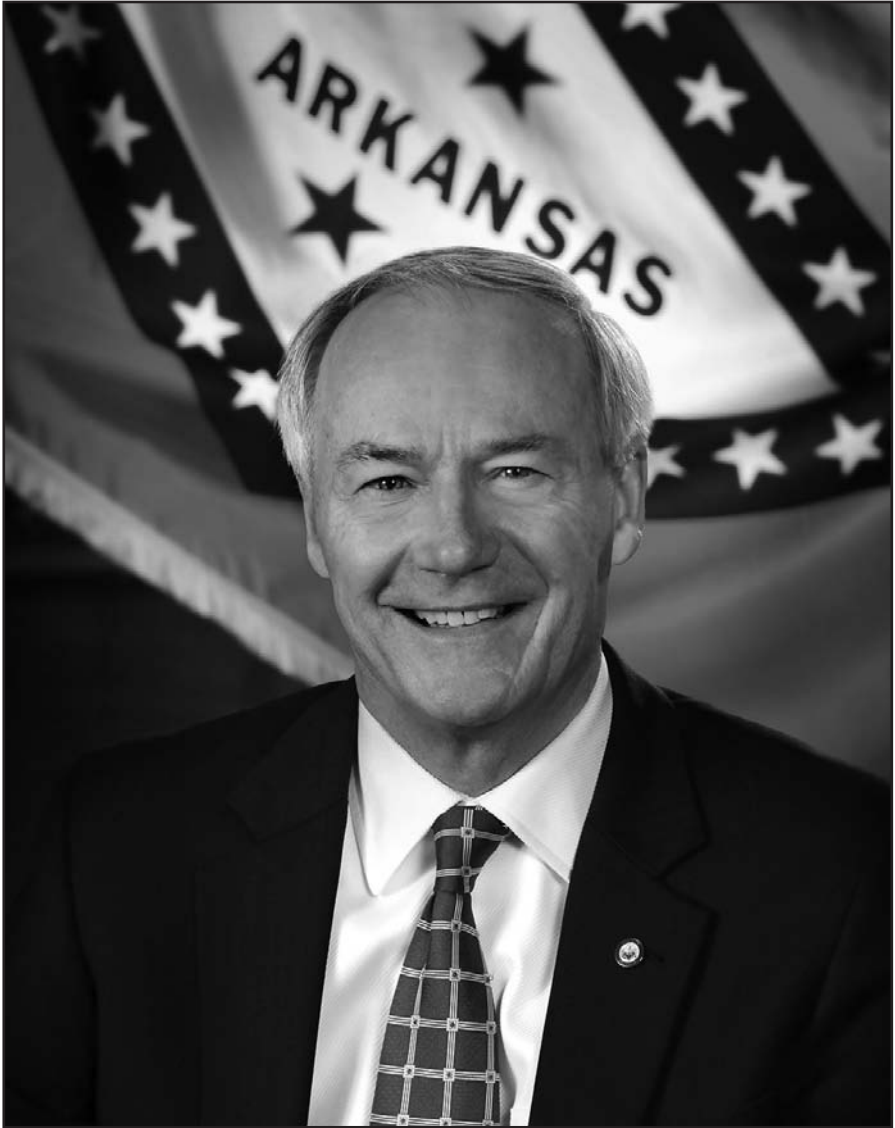


THE EXECUTIVE BRANCH

Arkansas's system of government has much in common with those developed and adopted by the original states and the federal government. It is based on the principle of dividing authority among three branches – executive, legislative and judiciary – which in theory thwarts imbalances of power favoring any single branch or individual.

The executive branch, headed by the governor in his or her role of chief executive, is responsible for administering the laws written and enacted by the legislative branch. The positions of governor, secretary of state, treasurer, and auditor of state represent continuations of appointive positions established during the territorial period (1819-1836). Other positions have been added to the constitutional officers' roster over time. In the state's first decades, of these only the governor was elected by the people; the others were elected in a joint session of the Legislative Assembly. This system was ended by a reform embodied in the Constitution of 1868, then reaffirmed in the Constitution of 1874: such officers would henceforth be chosen by the full electorate. Currently, seven constitutional officers or executives are elected statewide; they serve terms of four years. Of the seven, six maintain offices in the Capitol, while the attorney general's office is located in a downtown Little Rock office tower.

In addition to the state's constitutional officers, there are literally dozens of executive branch departments, agencies, boards and commissions that supervise, advise, administer and regulate in accordance with enacted laws, rules and regulations.

William Asa Hutchinson was born on December 3, 1950, in Bentonville (Benton County) to John Malcolm Sr. and Coral Hutchinson, the youngest of six children. He graduated from Springdale High School in 1968 and from Bob Jones University in Greenville, South Carolina, earning a B.S. in accounting in 1972. He earned his Juris Doctor from the University of Arkansas School of Law in Fayetteville (Washington County).

Hutchinson first held public office as the city attorney of Bentonville from 1977 to 1978. In 1982, he was appointed the U.S. Attorney for the Western district of Arkansas, a post he held to 1985. Hutchinson was a partner in the Karr & Hutchinson law firm from 1986 to 1996 and was active in the Arkansas Republican Party. Became the co-chairman and later chairman of the Arkansas Republican Party from 1990 to 1995. In 1998, he campaigned for and won the Third District U.S. House seat vacated by his older brother Tim; he was re-elected in 1998 and 2000.

In 2001, Hutchinson was picked by President George W. Bush to lead the Drug Enforcement Administration. In 2003, he left this post to become the Department of Homeland Security's Undersecretary for Border and Transportation Security. He resigned this post in 2005 to enter private law practice; in 2006 he ran, unsuccessfully,

for governor in Arkansas. After the election, he resumed his law practice in Washington DC and in Rogers, Arkansas.

In 2014, Hutchinson again sought the governorship of Arkansas. He faced no opposition in the primary election and in November he defeated the Democratic contender, former Congressman Mike Ross, with over fifty-five percent of the vote.

While at Bob Jones University, he met his future wife, Susan Burrell. They were married in 1973 and have four children.

ABOUT THE OFFICE

The post of governor was included in Arkansas's Constitution of 1836, an elected continuation of the appointive territorial office. The governor is the head of the executive branch of state government and thus directs policies for state agencies. By issuing executive orders, the governor implements or gives administrative effect to provisions of law. The governor proposes legislation, exercises authority over the Arkansas National Guard, may grant clemencies, pardons and commutations, and appoints members to boards of state agencies and commissions.



LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR
Tim Griffin

John Timothy Griffin (born in 1968), an attorney and former U.S. Representative, is the Republican Lieutenant Governor of Arkansas. He was born in Charlotte, North Carolina, and grew up in Magnolia (Columbia County) in southern Arkansas. He graduated from Hendrix College and in 1994 from Tulane Law School in New Orleans, Louisiana.

After graduation, Griffin worked with Special Federal Prosecutor David Barrett, then became the Senior Investigative Counsel for the House Committee on Government Reform. From 1999 to 2005, Griffin occupied several positions within the Justice Department and the Republican National Committee; During the George W. Bush Administration, in 2006-2007, Griffin served as Special Assistant to the President and Deputy Director of Political Affairs and, later, as U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of Arkansas.

In late 2007, Griffin returned to the private sector, working in law and public relations, before seeking the Congressional seat for Arkansas's Second District in 2010. Griffin faced no competition in the primary and won with 58% of the popular vote in November. In 2012 he was re-elected. In 2014, Tim Griffin announced that he would seek nomination as his party's candidate for Lieutenant Governor. He defeated two contenders in the primary before going on to success in the general election.

In addition to his public service, Griffin has served as an officer in the U.S. Army

Reserve, Judge Advocate General's (JAG) Corps, for over 20 years and served a tour of active duty with the 101st Airborne Division in Mosul, Iraq. He currently holds the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. He lives in Little Rock with his wife, Elizabeth, and their three children.

ABOUT THE OFFICE

The office of lieutenant governor originated in the Constitution of 1864, eliminated with the adoption of the Constitution of 1874 and reinstated by Amendment 6 to the Arkansas Constitution. Although Arkansas voters narrowly approved the amendment in 1914, the speaker of the house at the time declared the results invalid because the initiative had failed to win votes equal to a majority of the highest total number of votes cast in that year. The position remained vacant until 1926, when the state Supreme Court ruled that a majority of those voting on a specific ballot question was sufficient for its passage, thus validating Amendment 6.

The lieutenant governor is one of seven constitutional officers. He or she acts as governor when the state's chief executive is absent from the state or is otherwise unable to carry out the responsibilities of the office. The lieutenant governor is the first in line to succeed the governor in the event of impeachment, removal from office or death. The lieutenant governor presides over the Arkansas Senate during the biennial legislative session, as well as during any special sessions. He or she can cast a vote in the 35-member Senate, but only when such is needed to break a tie.



SECRETARY OF STATE
Mark Martin

ABOUT THE OFFICE

Mark Russell Martin (born in 1968) is Arkansas's Republican Secretary of State. A native of Kansas City, Kansas, Martin grew up as part of a farming family in the Delta and graduated from Hughes (St. Francis County) High School. He served in the United States Navy, working in a nuclear engineering laboratory. After his naval service, Martin earned his Bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering from the University of Arkansas.

Prior to becoming Secretary of State, Martin served three terms as a State Representative, representing District 87 and as President of M3 Engineering. While in the legislature, Martin served on the Budget, Insurance & Commerce, Education, and Advanced Communications & Information Technology Committees, and as Chairman of the Economic & Tax Policy Committee.

In 2010, Martin won the first of two terms as Secretary of State, the first Republican to hold that post since the end of Reconstruction. In 2014, Martin garnered both the largest number of votes and the highest percentage of votes cast for any of the Republican statewide office candidates. As Secretary of State, Martin serves as Chair of the State Board of Election Commissioners and the Capitol Arts and Grounds Commission. He has served as Chair of the Information Network of Arkansas Board and is a member of the State Board of Apportionment.

Martin and his wife, the former Sharon Marie Tilley, have two daughters and one son. They reside in Prairie Grove in Washington County.

The secretary of state's office was established in the Constitution of 1836 as a continuation of the appointed office of territorial secretary. The Constitution of 1868 made the office elective, a change reaffirmed in the Constitution of 1874. Traditionally, the office concerned itself with records keeping, particularly maintaining a register of the official acts and proclamations of the governor.

Today, the secretary of state serves as the state's chief elections officer, caretaker of the Capitol and its grounds, the custodian and conservator of various public records, the registrar of copyrights, agencies, notary commissions and corporations doing business in Arkansas, as well as collector of the state's franchise tax. In addition, the secretary of state or his or her representative serves on several bodies, including the state Board of Apportionment and the Capitol Zoning District Commission.



ATTORNEY GENERAL
Leslie Rutledge

Leslie Carol Rutledge (born in 1976), attorney and prosecutor, is the Republican 56th Attorney General of Arkansas and the first woman to be elected to the office.

Rutledge was born in Batesville (Independence County) and grew up on a nearby cattle farm. She attended public school in Batesville and graduated from the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville before earning her Juris Doctor at the Bowen School of Law of the University of Arkansas at Little Rock. She began her legal career as clerk to Arkansas Court of Appeals Judge Josephine Hart. Rutledge was deputy counsel for Arkansas Governor Mike Huckabee and later served as legal counsel on Huckabee's 2008 presidential campaign. She has also been a deputy prosecuting attorney in Lonoke County and an attorney for the Arkansas Division of Children and Family Services. She served as deputy counsel at the National Republican Congressional Campaign Committee before she was named counsel for the Republican National Committee. Prior to her election as attorney general, Rutledge founded and practiced law at The Rutledge Firm, PLLC.

Rutledge sought the Republican nomination for Attorney General of Arkansas in the 2014 election. She faced two opponents in the primary; she finished with a plurality of less than 50 percent of the vote, so faced second-place finisher David Sterling in a

runoff election. Rutledge won the runoff, then defeated Democratic and Libertarian candidates in the general election.

In December 2015, Rutledge wed Boyce Johnson, a farmer from Marion (Crittenden County). They maintain residences in both Little Rock and Crittenden County.

ABOUT THE OFFICE

The position of attorney general was first created by an Act of February 3, 1843. This statute designated the state's attorney for its fifth judicial district "the attorney general of the State of Arkansas," briefly set out the office's duties and set its salary at \$600 per year. In the Constitution of 1868 the post was made elective and it was reaffirmed as such in the 1874 revision.

Act 131 of the 1911 Legislature spelled out fundamental duties of the office: the attorney general would represent the state in legal actions argued in federal courts including the United States Supreme Court, where the interest of the State was involved. In addition, the attorney general would supply opinions to prosecuting attorneys concerning interpretations of constitutional, civil and criminal law. Over the years, the duties and undertakings of the office have expanded to include participation on or advice to boards and commissions, protection of youth and senior citizens, negotiation of compromises on taxes owed the state and other matters.



TREASURER OF STATE
Dennis Milligan

Dennis L. Milligan (born in 1957) is Arkansas's Republican Treasurer of State. He was elected to the office in 2014. As Treasurer, he serves as the State's banker and is responsible for an investment portfolio of approximately \$3.5 billion.

Dennis Milligan was born in Conway (Faulkner County) and graduated from Little Rock's McClellan High School in 1976. After attending the University of Arkansas at Little Rock, Milligan worked as a representative of the Mogul Corporation before founding WTS, a water-treatment services provider. He also engaged in real estate development and construction and in 2004, he unsuccessfully campaigned for the District 29 seat in the Arkansas House of Representatives.

In 2010, Milligan was elected circuit clerk of Saline County and was re-elected in 2012. In 2014 he entered the race to become Treasurer of State. He defeated Duncan Baird in the primary, winning 53 percent of the vote, before besting Democratic and Libertarian contenders in the general election. As treasurer, Milligan oversees the state's 529 College Investing program. His office administers AR Finance, AR Future, a financial education curriculum under the Arkansas 529 program that increases awareness and financial literacy among Arkansas students.

Dennis Milligan lives in Alexander (Saline County), married to his junior high school sweetheart, the former Tina Summers. They have one daughter, a son-in-law, and three grandchildren.

ABOUT THE OFFICE

Created by the 1836 Constitution, the treasurer of state's mission, as expressed in the Arkansas Code, is to "receive and keep all the moneys of the state not expressly required... to be kept by some other person; to disburse the public moneys...; to keep... an account of [receipts and disbursements];" and to render accounts to the auditor, governor and Legislature on a regular basis. In practice, the Treasurer's office oversees fund distributions to county and city governments, coordinates state fund transfers, distributes revenue to state agencies (including public colleges and universities), manages state investments, including trust funds and certificates of deposit, verifies funds deposited with state agencies and processes checks issued by state agencies as payments for services rendered.

The treasurer also services rural medical revolving loans and grants, and processes debt service, investing, and agent fees for general obligation bonds and college savings bonds. The state treasurer serves in other posts, including the secretary of the State Board of Finance, ex officio member of the Arkansas Public Employees Retirement System Board of Trustees and member of the Arkansas Rural Endowment Fund Board of Trustees.



AUDITOR OF STATE
Andrea Lea

Andrea Christine Lea (born in 1957) is the Arkansas State Auditor and a Republican former member of the Arkansas House of Representatives from Russellville, Arkansas. Reared in a military family, Lea lived in New Hampshire, Hawaii, and Newbury Park in Ventura County, California. She earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Emergency Administration and Management from Arkansas Tech University in Russellville, graduating in 2004. Prior to her legislative service, Lea was a member of the Russellville City Council and then a justice of the peace on the Pope County Quorum Court.

In 2008, she was elected as State Representative for House District 68 and was unopposed for a second term in 2010. In 2012, Lea was switched to House District 71 as a result of redistricting and again ran without opposition. Lea was a member of the Arkansas Legislative Council and in her last term in the House chaired the State Agencies and Governmental Affairs Committee.

In 2014, Lea sought the Republican nomination for Auditor of State. She first defeated contender Ken Yang in the Republican primary, then Democrat Regina Hampton Stewart and Libertarian Brian Leach in the general election.

Andrea Lea and her husband, Phillip, have three children. She enjoys sailing and bicycling.

ABOUT THE OFFICE

The auditor's office was created in the Constitution of 1836, continuing a territorial office. The auditor acts as the state's general accountant, keeping track of all fund and appropriation balances of all state agencies, and writing warrants (checks) in payment of the liabilities of the state.

The auditor is also the disbursing officer for certain federal funds and for approximately 1,000 individuals including Supreme and Appellate Court justices, Circuit and Chancery Court judges, prosecuting and special prosecuting attorneys, court reporters, trial court administrative assistants, the House of Representatives, the Senate, county juvenile probate and intake officers. The auditor also disburses Continuing Education funds for County and Circuit Clerks, Treasurers and Collectors.

The auditor is a member of the State Board of Finance and the administrator of the state's Unclaimed Property Act. He or she serves on several boards and commissions, including the Arkansas Public Employees Retirement System and the Arkansas Teachers Retirement System. The auditor also serves on the Boards of Continuing Education for County and Circuit Clerks, County Treasurers and County Collectors, and administers their continuing education program.



COMMISSIONER OF STATE LANDS
John Thurston

John Manuel Thurston (born in 1972), the Republican Commissioner of State Lands, was first elected in November of 2010 and has served two full terms in this office. Thurston was born in Little Rock and was raised in Saline County, attended Sheridan High School and graduated in 1991. He attended Henderson State University and later graduated from Agape College in Little Rock with a diploma in Biblical Studies. Thurston is a licensed minister and was a Certified Religious Assistant in the Arkansas state prison system. He served 13 years on the staff of the Agape Church in West Little Rock prior to his tenure as land commissioner.

John Thurston currently serves as the chairman of the Arkansas Natural and Cultural Resources Council. He is also the past president of the Western States Land Commissioners Association.

John Thurston resides in Little Rock, Arkansas (Pulaski County) with his wife Joanna and their five children.

ABOUT THE OFFICE

This office was created by the Legislature in 1868 as the Commissioner of Immigration and State Lands; the title was to be awarded as an additional responsibility for the commissioner of public works and internal improvements until such a time as the Legislature provided for appointment of a separate officer. The post became elective in 1874, its present title was adopted in 1929.

The commissioner's office today fulfills the functions of the defunct state land office. Its primary tasks are the sale and redemption of tax-delinquent lands throughout the state, as well as the disposal by sale of suitable state properties, liaison with county clerks, safeguarding of deeds to all state properties and collecting delinquent taxes on real property.

The office also manages mineral leasing for most state owned lands, including navigable waterways. The Commissioner chairs the state's Natural Resources Committee, whose job is to ensure that state owned lands are leased in a manner that best benefits the state, while protecting the environment. The office also has jurisdiction over most of the submerged lands and islands in the navigable waters of the state. Further, the office has the authority to donate for public use tax delinquent land to state agencies, colleges and universities, local governments and even nonprofit organizations under the provisions of the Urban Homesteads Act.

The Commissioner of State Lands is additionally responsible for preserving and making available the records of the office. These include early federal surveys, as well as documentation of colonial-era French and Spanish land grants. More recent documents include deeds that convey real property to state agencies, as well as documents related to tax sales, redemptions and donations.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNORS

The post of lieutenant governor was authorized under the Constitution of 1864. It was vacant between the resignation of James M. Johnson in January 1871 and the inauguration of Volney V. Smith in early 1872. The office was eliminated altogether in the Constitution of 1874, reauthorized by Amendment 6 in 1914 and, after clarification of questions related to ratification requirements, finally re-filled in 1927.

ARKANSAS GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The 135 men and women who serve in the Arkansas House of Representatives and Senate come from every area of the state and represent many vocations, professions and backgrounds, a diversity that mirrors the people of Arkansas.

Arkansas's system of government resembles those developed early in our nation's history and adopted on national, state and local levels. It maintains a division of authority among three branches — legislative, executive and judicial — which balance the government's power to prevent its abuse.

The General Assembly is the legislative branch of state government and has the authority to write and enact state laws. The executive branch, with the Governor as chief executive, administers these laws. The judicial branch, headed by the state Supreme Court, administers justice and interprets the law in accordance with the Constitution.

There are 35 members of the state Senate and 100 members of the House. The Lieutenant Governor serves as President of the Senate. In his absence, the Senate President *Pro Tempore* presides. The presiding officer of the House, the Speaker, is elected by House members at the beginning of each regular session.

The Arkansas Constitution calls for the General Assembly to meet in regular session for no more than 75 days each odd-numbered year and in “fiscal” or budget session for 30 days in even-numbered years. Sessions may be extended by a three-fourths vote of the membership of both houses. Regular sessions convene on the second Monday in January, while fiscal sessions commence on the second Monday in February.

It is common during a session for the General Assembly to address as many as 2,000 bills and resolutions, all introduced by members of the House or Senate. Much of the study and discussion of legislation takes place in committee during the interim, the period between legislative sessions.

The Arkansas General Assembly has, over its decades of operation, developed a complex structure of committees and subcommittees which deal with matters of state great and small during both session and interim. Legislative meetings are open to all, continuing Arkansas's tradition of inviting constituent scrutiny of public affairs.

HOW A BILL BECOMES A LAW

A bill is, at its heart, simply an idea that someone would like to see become law. Bills address matters great and small, ranging from setting penalties for committing particular crimes to designating official state symbols. Such an idea can originate with anyone, but only a member of the state's General Assembly, a senator or a representative, may take that idea, and guide it along the way from thought to enacted law.

Drafting a bill simply means putting the idea into legal language and making sure it meets the requirements of the Joint Rules of the House and Senate. The actual drafting is done by the Bureau of Legislative Research.

Introduction of a bill can be made by any member of the House or Senate, and more than one legislator can sponsor a bill. A bill is given to the chief clerk of the House or the secretary of the Senate and assigned a number. The sponsor(s) of a bill signs the original copy.

First and second readings are the next steps. It is customary for a bill to be read the first and second time on the same day, but only the number and title are read unless the members vote otherwise. After reading, a bill is assigned to committee.

There are ten standing committees in the House and nine similar standing committees in the Senate. Each House committee has twenty members; Senate committees have seven or eight members each. There are five joint committees made up of members from both the House and Senate.

During legislative sessions, committees usually meet in the morning to examine bills. Committees generally are where public comments are gathered on proposed

legislation. During a committee hearing, the senator or representative sponsoring a bill will explain the measure and often will bring in expert testimony as support. Those who oppose a bill will also present their case, and frequently the committee will hold public hearings.

Committee action is crucial to the legislative process. A committee's responsibility is to examine a bill carefully and make one of three recommendations "Do pass," "Do pass as amended," or "Do not pass."

The committee report on a bill is read to the entire membership of the House or Senate. If a member of the General Assembly wants to change the wording of a bill, add something or take something out of a bill, the senator or representative will amend the bill. While any legislator can propose an amendment, it takes a majority of the entire membership of one house to adopt an amendment. Once adopted, the amended bill must be considered by a committee.

When the committee has completed its deliberations, the bill is put in final form with or without amendments and placed on the calendar. The bill is now ready to be read a third time, debated, voted on by the entire membership of the House or Senate. It is up to the bill's sponsor to bring it up for final consideration.

Most bills can be passed by a majority vote (51 in the House; 18 in the Senate), but most bills that appropriate money and some that increase taxes require a three-fourths vote of the membership of each body.

ARKANSAS SENATE

The 35 members of the Senate are elected from 35 districts. The districts vary in size, but the population is approximately the same in each—about 83,300 based on figures from the 2010 U. S. Census. Boundaries of all legislative districts are redrawn after the U. S. Census is taken every 10 years, to ensure equal representation in the Legislature for every resident of Arkansas.

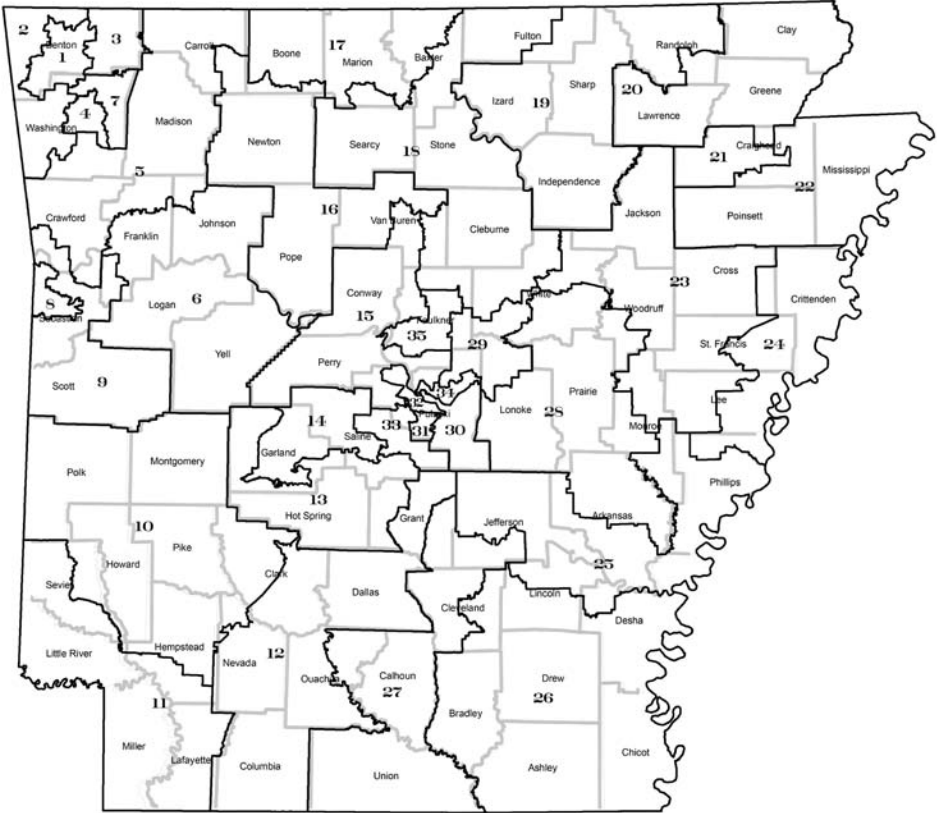
A person must be at least 25 years old, a U. S. citizen, a resident of Arkansas for two years and a resident of his or her senatorial district for one year before being eligible to serve in the Senate. Senators serve staggered four-year terms, with one-half of the Senate membership being elected every two years. A constitutional amendment adopted in 2014 permits Arkansas legislators to serve a total of sixteen years, in one chamber or divided between the House and Senate.

The lieutenant governor is the president of the Senate and presides during the sessions. He or she does not participate in debate and votes only to break a tie. The Senate president *pro tempore* serves in the absence of the lieutenant governor and is elected from the Senate membership. The president *pro tempore* follows the lieutenant governor in the line of succession to the office of the governor.

Much of the Senate's work is carried out by nine standing committees whose members review and recommend action on legislation. The nine standing committees are Agriculture, Forestry, and Economic Development; City, County, and Local Affairs; Education; Insurance and Commerce; Judiciary; Public Health, Welfare and Labor; Revenue and Taxation; State Agencies and Governmental Affairs; and Transportation, Technology and Legislative Affairs.

In addition to the standing committees, senators also serve on joint committees and on Senate select committees. Joint committees include Joint Budget, Joint Retirement and Social Security Programs, Joint Energy, Joint Performance Review, and Interim Child and Youth. Senate select committees include the Efficiency Committee and the Committee on Rules, Resolutions, Memorials.

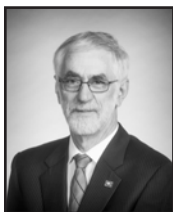

ARKANSAS HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

The House of Representatives consists of 100 members elected from 100 districts which, like the Senate districts, are drawn or apportioned so as to contain roughly equal populations. Each House district has an average population of about 30,000, based on the 2010 U.S. Census.

A House member must be at least 21 years old, a resident of Arkansas for two years and a resident of his or her district for one year. Members of the House serve two-year terms. A constitutional amendment adopted in 2014 permits Arkansas legislators to serve a total of sixteen years, in one chamber or divided between the House and Senate.

The Speaker of the House presides over the body and is elected by the membership every two years. It is customary for the speaker to designate a speaker *pro tempore* who presides in the absence of the speaker. The speaker also may designate representatives from each of the House's four caucus districts to serve as assistant speakers *pro tempore*.

The House employs an electronic voting system. To vote, a member pushes buttons on his or her desk. The green button means "yes," the red button "no" and the yellow button "present." The votes appear on two large electronic boards at the front of the House chamber and are counted at the speaker's desk. An official record of the tabulations is placed into the journals. The House has ten standing committees:

Education; Judiciary; Public Health, Welfare and Labor; Public Transportation; Revenue and Taxation; Aging, Children and Youth; Legislative and Military Affairs; Insurance and Commerce; and State Agencies and Governmental Affairs. Each representative serves on two Standing Committees and each committee has twenty members. The House Speaker selects standing committee chairs and vice-chairs from the respective committee rosters.

In addition to the standing committees, representatives serve on select committees. The Joint Budget, Joint Retirement and Social Security Programs, Joint Energy, Joint Performance Review, and Joint Committee on Advanced Communications and Information Technology Committees operate jointly with the Senate. Two other select committees—House Rules and House Management—operate exclusively within the House.

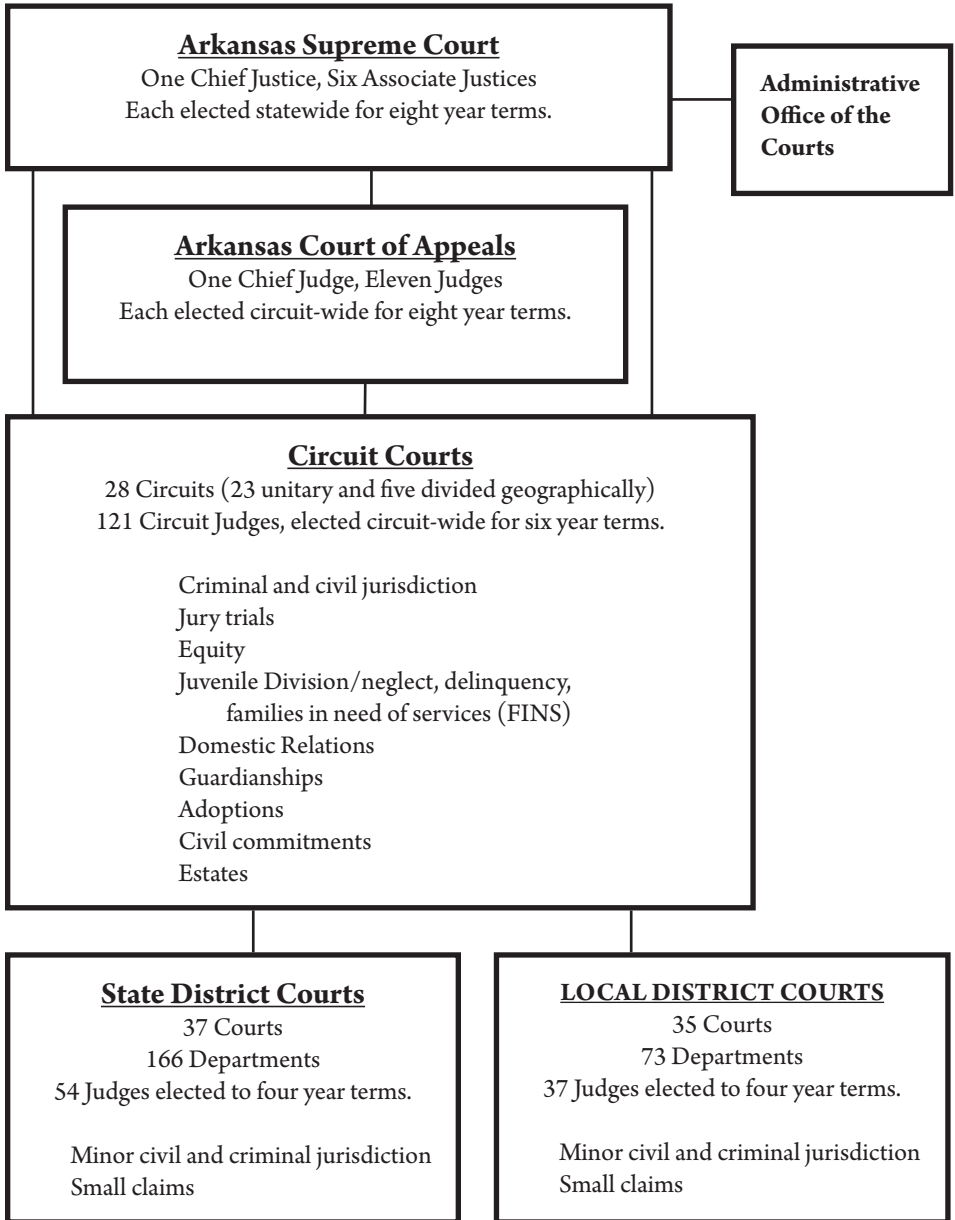

HISTORICAL ROSTERS

Before 1803, legal authority over the area that became the State of Arkansas was exercised by, successively, the French Superior Council, the Spanish Secular Cabildo, or the colonial governor in New Orleans. At Arkansas Post, the judges included a feudal seigneur, various subordinates of Jacques Levens (the director of John Law's Arkansas concession) and, most commonly, post commandants who exercised both civil and criminal jurisdiction.

With the Louisiana Purchase of 1803, Arkansas, as a part of the District of Louisiana, was attached to the Territory of Indiana for judicial purposes. In 1804, Indiana territorial Governor William Henry Harrison and three territorial judges held court in the district capital of St. Louis and enacted laws for the region. The following year, the name of the district was changed to the Territory of Louisiana; President Thomas Jefferson made three judicial appointments to the Superior Court.

An 1806 act of the Territorial Legislature created the District of Arkansas. Following the admission of the State of Louisiana in 1812, Arkansas remained a district of the newly named Territory of Missouri, and the Superior Court retained its jurisdiction. On March 2, 1819, President James Monroe approved a congressional act that established a separate Territory of Arkansas and, two days later, appointed three judges to the Arkansas Superior Court. The first sessions were held at Arkansas Post in November 1819 and January 1820. Congress added a fourth judge to the panel in 1828.

Judges of the Superior Court of the State of Arkansas

On June 15, 1836, President Andrew Jackson signed a bill to admit the State of Arkansas to the Union, effective the Fourth of July. Article VI, Section 1, of the Arkansas Constitution of 1836 vested the judicial power of the state “in one Supreme Court, in Circuit Courts, in County Courts and in Justices of the Peace.” Section 2 declared that the Supreme Court would consist of three judges, including a chief justice who would “have appellate jurisdiction only.”

Although the Reconstruction Constitution of 1868 added two justices, the Constitution of 1874 negated the expansion but stipulated that when the population of the state should “amount to one million, the General Assembly may, if deemed necessary, increase the number of judges of the Supreme Court to five”(Ark. Const. art. 7, §§ 3). That milestone was reached by the end of the next decade, and in Act 19 of 1889 the Legislature authorized a total of five justices. Constitutional sanction of the enlargement came in 1924 with voter approval of Amendment 9, which also allowed for the future legislative creation of two additional judgeships. Act 205 of 1925 brought the number of justices to seven, the current complement of the court.

Judges of the Court of Appeals

Article VI, Section 1, of the Arkansas Constitution of 1836 vested the judicial power of the state “in one Supreme Court, in Circuit Courts, in County Courts and in Justices of the Peace.”

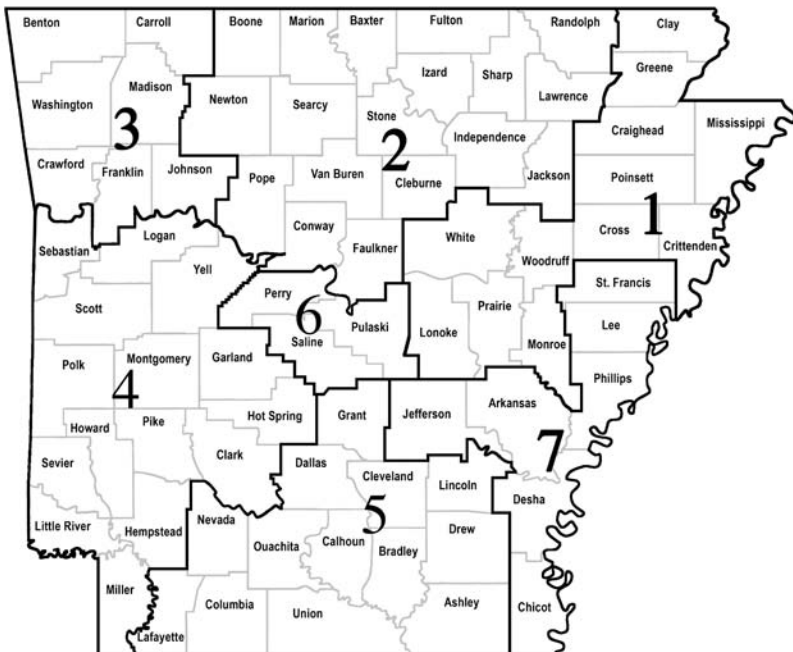
Amendment 58, approved by voters in 1978, authorized creation of a Court of Appeals “subject to the general superintending control of the Supreme Court.” Act 208 of 1979 created the appellate court and provided for six judges to be elected from districts across the state. A panel of judges appointed by Governor Bill Clinton served through 1980, when district elections were held.

In Act 1085 of 1993, the legislature provided for the doubling of the number of appellate court judges to twelve. Before the effective date arrived, however, the General Assembly, in Act 11 of the First Extraordinary Session of 1995, repealed certain sections of Act 1085 and staggered the court’s expansion. Under the act, three judges were appointed effective January 1, 1996, and another three effective January 1, 1997. Act 1812 of 2003 divided the state into seven districts for the election of judges to the Court of Appeals and set election dates for these judges.

The jurisdiction of the Arkansas Court of Appeals is determined by the Arkansas Supreme Court. There is no guaranteed right of appeal from the Arkansas Court of Appeals to the Arkansas Supreme Court; however, opinions decided by the Court of Appeals may be reviewed by the Arkansas Supreme Court on application by a party to the appeal, upon certification of the Arkansas Court of Appeals, or if the Arkansas Supreme Court decides the case is one that should have originally been assigned to it.

Judges of the Circuit Courts

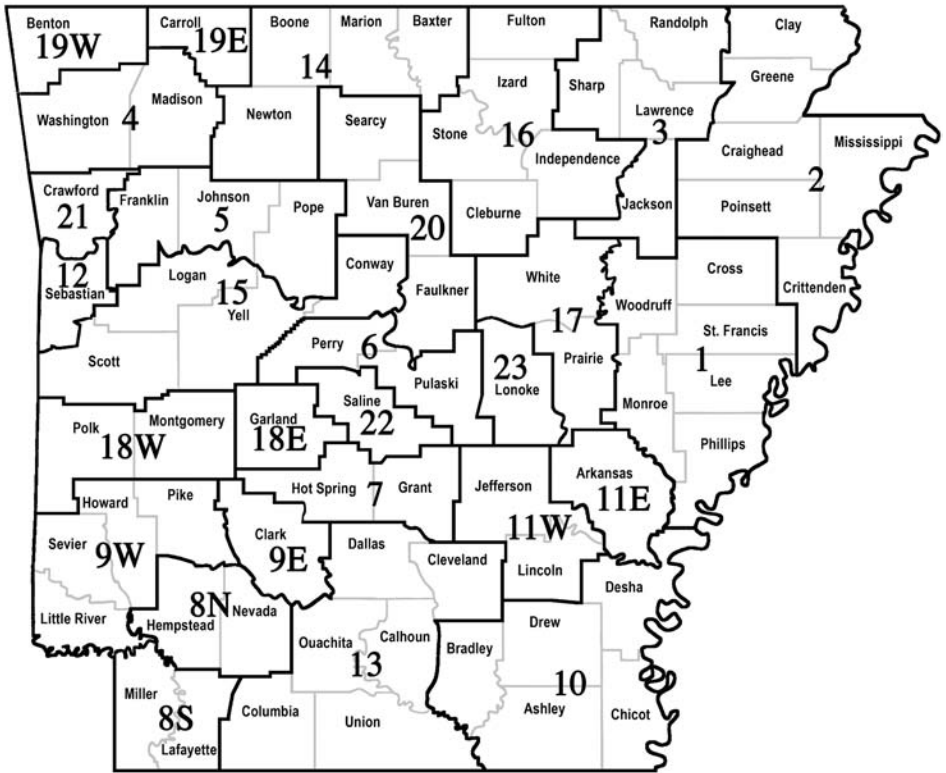
Article VI, Section 1, of the Arkansas Constitution of 1836 established the existence of circuit courts throughout the state, continuing a system established in 1823 under territorial law. Circuit courts once differentiated between courts of law and courts of equity (chancery courts); Arkansas Constitutional Amendment 80, which became effective in July 2001, eliminated this distinction and ordained that as of January 1, 2002, circuit courts should consist of five divisions: criminal, civil, probate, domestic relations, and juvenile. A 2006 administrative order of the Supreme Court required the judicial circuits to formulate administrative plans to better address the courts' growing and varied caseloads.

Circuit courts are considered general-jurisdiction trial courts; judges are elected for terms of six years on a non-partisan basis. Initially, Arkansas territory was divided into four circuits, which grew to seven in 1840, eight in 1846, shrank to six in 1848, then resumed expansion in 1860. Today, Arkansas is divided into twenty-three judicial circuits; five of these are subdivided into two sections. Before 1979, chancery and circuit court districts were not identical but in that year they were merged. In the following compilation, the circuits' designations are continued from their inception to the present day, irrespective of changes made in the number of circuits or in the counties which make up each one. Dates, unless otherwise indicated, mark beginning of service; where and when available, dates for end of term are also supplied.

During the last three decades of the Twentieth century, the larger circuits, particularly, were subdivided and judges assigned areas of specialty, the process culminating in a wholesale reorganization after the 2001 merging of the formerly separate courts of law and chancery. The following compilation is an attempt to reflect this reorganization.

For justices elected before 2001, indication is made of whether their affiliation was Circuit or Chancery; judges whose service began either in circuit or chancery courts prior to 2001 but continued past that date are listed in the "Combined" category, as are judges elected after 2001.

CHAPTER 6
ARKANSAS
ELECTIONS



ARKANSAS VOTING AND ELECTIONS

On March 2, 1819, the president of the United States approved a bill which created the Territory of Arkansas. To oversee the new territory, President James Monroe appointed James Miller, a hero of the War of 1812, as governor, and Robert Crittenden, a 21-year-old Kentuckian, as secretary of the territory. Miller's appointment was sent to Arkansas rather than to his New Hampshire home, delaying his arrival, but not delaying the establishment of government; the executive and judicial branches (consisting of Crittenden and three newly appointed Superior Court judges) constituted the legislature in the territory's "first grade" of government.

After an initial short session, two of the three appointed justices left the territory, never to return. In the absence of the governor, Crittenden scheduled the first territorial election for November 20, 1819, seeking to elevate Arkansas to the "second grade" of government with an elected General Assembly. Up to this point, residents of the territory had previously voted as citizens of Missouri Territory, electing local sheriffs, county clerks and delegates to the Missouri Assembly. On November 20, however, they voted as Arkansans for the first time, electing members of the new territorial assembly. Governor Miller arrived at Arkansas Post one month later; one of his first actions was to seek invalidation of the election's results. After much debate, Miller dropped his efforts, acquiescing to Crittenden's *fait accompli*.

During Arkansas's territorial period, suffrage was limited to white males

above the age of twenty-one, with some restrictions as to residence and dependent on paying property tax; unpropertied individuals were effectively excluded from the election rolls. The 1836 statehood Constitution removed the tax-payment requirement, allowing unlanded white male residents to vote. The Reconstruction Constitution of 1868 extended the vote to African-American males while incorporating other restrictions which had the effect of excluding Confederate loyalists and partisans, as well as opponents of the Fourteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, the criminal and the insane. In 1874, a new constitution was adopted; its language simplified the lengthy provisions and restrictions of its predecessor and it remains the basis for determining who may vote in Arkansas's elections.

Election laws have not, however, remained static since 1874. In 1892, the people of the state approved a constitutional amendment establishing a poll tax of one dollar per male voter. Applied to black and white alike, it theoretically posed no exclusionary impediment of African-American voting but, in practice, discouraged poor voters, black and white alike, from seeking to vote. The poll tax amendment was declared invalid by the state Supreme Court; it was replaced with another measure in 1908. The poll tax rolls constituted Arkansas's only voter registration system until 1964 when voters approved Amendment 51, striking down the poll tax.

After the all-male legislature failed in 1911 and again in 1913 to approve voting for women, the Arkansas Woman Suffrage

ON SENATORIAL CLASSES

Association formed to press hard to get it approved. With support from progressive politicians, the General Assembly of 1917 enacted legislation authorizing women to vote in primary elections. Two years later Arkansas ratified the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which allowed women to vote in all elections. It was the twelfth state in the nation, and the second southern state, to ratify the amendment. Shortly after ratification, the town of Winslow, in Washington County, won national fame by choosing an all-woman town government.

Arkansas elections are overseen by the State Board of Election Commissioners and the Secretary of State's Office. Members of the Board of Election Commissioners are appointed by the governor, the legislative chambers and the two major political parties; it is chaired by the secretary of state. Its main duties are to disburse funds for state-funded elections, development of resources for educating and assisting candidates and local election officials, certifying election equipment and monitoring elections.

The Elections Division of the Secretary of State's Office maintains the state's election records and generally assists county officials with scheduling and conducting federal, state and district elections. The division leads the state's program to comply with federal election laws such as the National Voter Registration Act and the Help America Vote Act; it has played a central role in establishing and maintaining Arkansas's uniform statewide voter registration system and continues to help oversee training on the state's electronic voting systems. The division also serves as a clearinghouse for campaign finance reports that are filed with the Arkansas Ethics Commission.

The three classes of U.S. senators, each currently including 33 or 34 senators, constitute the means used by the United States Senate for describing the schedules of Senate seats' elections and of the expiration of the terms of office of the senators holding the respective seats. Each numbered Congress sits for two years, and each senator normally serves a term of six years in office.

The classes date from 1789, when the principle of staggered terms of office was adopted by the U.S. Senate. Class I senators were to leave office after two years, Class II after four years and Class III after a full term of six years. In this way, it was ensured that only one-third of Senate seats would be in play during any single election year, ensuring continuity.

When a new state is admitted to the Union, its two senators are assigned terms that correspond to those of two different classes, among the three classes described above. Which two classes is determined by a scheme that keeps the three classes as close to the same size as possible, i.e., that avoids any class differing by more than one from the minimum-sized class.

Arkansas elects one Class II senator and one Class III senator. Before the ratification of the 17th Amendment on May 31, 1913, U.S. senators were chosen by the General Assembly. Arkansas Senator Joe T. Robinson enjoys the distinction of being the last U.S. Senator to be selected for this office under the old Constitutional system.

This union index of Arkansas legislators supplements the session rosters found elsewhere in this volume. It is an updated and corrected version of the one that appeared in the 2008 *Historical Report of the Secretary of State*, which was itself a revision and development of one compiled by former State Representative Jerry Hinshaw and included in his *Call The Roll: the first 150 years of the Arkansas Legislature* (1986). The *Report's* preparers have resolved inconsistencies, errors and omissions mirroring those found in earlier *Historical Reports* and in original legislative rosters but, perhaps inevitably, some remain: some legislative rosters are incomplete and in many cases, legislators' names appear with variant spellings, particularly in (but not limited to) the earliest sessions.

We acknowledge the careful cross-checking work of 2018 summer interns Scott Laxton and Murphey Iradukunda, as well as the keen eye of Dr. Guy Lancaster, editor of the *Encyclopedia of Arkansas History and Culture*.

ARKANSAS'S AFRICAN AMERICAN LEGISLATORS 1868-2018

Between 1868 and 1893, significant numbers of African Americans served in the chambers of the Arkansas Legislature. Initially elected as members of Republican-dominated Reconstruction governments, Black legislators remained visible and active in both chambers through the 1870s and 1880s. As many as eighty-six served in the Arkansas legislature through the 1893 session. Almost all were Republican loyalists, although a handful were elected as Greenback Party candidates and at least two as Democrats.

Ultimately, however, both legislation and political parties in Arkansas followed regional trends: by the 1890s, African Americans faced increasing obstacles to voting and were effectively abandoned by major-party leadership. Twelve African Americans served in the 1891 Assembly; the 1893 session included five and in the next session there were none. For the next eight decades, no African Americans were elected to or seated in Arkansas's legislative chambers.

1973 saw a sea-change in Arkansas politics: four African Americans took their places among Arkansas's solons. Richard Mays, Dr. William Townsend and Henry Wilkins III began their careers in the Arkansas House, while Dr. Jerry Jewell entered the State Senate. They were few, but their numbers would increase; in the 91st General Assembly, African Americans make up about eleven percent of Arkansas's legislature: three state senators and eleven state representatives.

WOMEN OF THE ARKANSAS LEGISLATURE 1923-2018

In 1922, Arkansas Governor Thomas Chipman McRae appointed Frances Hunt of Pine Bluff to fill an interim vacancy in the Arkansas House of Representatives. Hunt was not content to serve out a fractional term: that year both she and Erle Chambers of Little Rock, the first female graduate of the University of Arkansas Law Department, sought and won election to the Arkansas House. Both Hunt and Chambers would serve two terms in the House, where they cosponsored legislation to improve the lot of women and children. Notably, Frances Hunt championed Arkansas's ratification of the Child Labor Amendment, submitted to the states by Congress in 1924, which would have allowed Congress to regulate working condition for those under the age of 18. On June 24, 1924, Arkansas voted to ratify the measure, barely two months after it was submitted to the states; it was the first state to take this step.

Arkansas was not, strictly speaking, on the leading edge of woman suffrage and political participation, but acknowledgement of women's rights emerged early in its history. In 1835, the territorial legislature enacted a measure that established that women's property could not be used without her consent to pay a spouse's outstanding pre-marital debts. In 1846, Governor Thomas Drew approved the Arkansas Married Woman's Property Law, allowing a woman to register her property at her county courthouse, establishing sole ownership.

The social disruption that accompanied the War Between the States opened some opportunities for women's participation in public affairs. Although excluded from the vote, women in post-war Arkansas played an essential role in developing memorial organizations such as the United Daughters of the Confederacy; those with a more practical focus became involved in civic betterment groups and clubs while women from rural and agricultural backgrounds found themselves drawn to such organizations as the Grangers and the Agricultural Wheel.

This did not mean, however, that suffrage was forgotten. In 1868, woman suffrage legislation was introduced in the Arkansas legislature. It was not successful, but Arkansas women did not let the matter rest. Arkansas suffragists organized in the 1890s, aligning themselves with the national woman suffrage movement. After a suffrage measure failed in the Arkansas legislature in 1913, advocates formed the Arkansas Woman Suffrage Association to lobby for women's full citizenship. In 1917, the Arkansas General assembly recognized the right of women to vote in primary elections. A full suffrage measure fell short in the Legislature of 1919, but in that same year Arkansas became the twelfth state in the nation and the second in the South to approve the Nineteenth Amendment, establishing women's right to vote in all elections.

Arkansas's first female legislators were harbingers of a slow process of incorporation: over the next three decades, only eight more women served in the Assembly. Beginning in the mid-1950s, however, the numbers of woman legislators began to slowly increase as a portion of the total. The trend is ascendant: at this writing (2018), eighteen women serve in the state House and another eight in the state Senate, totaling twenty-six, or slightly less than one-fifth of the Legislature, compared to the nationwide fraction of just over one-quarter.
